WILLIAM R. CROSS CALLED BY DEATH

William Ryla Cross, who died at the residence, 2195 North Fourth street, Monday at the age of 77 years, had been a resident of Salem since 1915 and of the Pacific coast since 1911. He first visited the coast in 1887.

Cross was born November 11, 1887, in Parker county, Texas. Thirteen children were born to Cross and Ellen Cochran, whom he married June 7, 1877, in Hood county, Texas.
