TEAMSTERS' CHIEF DECLINES PROMISE

Cannot Say There'll Be No Violence Because Reds Prevalent, Says

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Promises that no violence will mark the local teamsters' strike if police guards are withdrawn cannot be given, the international president of the Teamsters' union said today, because Oregon and Portland are "hotbeds of communism and labor persecution."

Daniel J. Tobin, Indianapolis, told the 400 delegates to the union's convention here that "so far as our people are concerned, we could guarantee no violence... but the communists ever take the opportunity to raise hell during strikes."

Tobin was referring to an interview he had with Mayor Joseph K. Carson, when he asked the mayor to withdraw guards from the large department store affected by the strike. Tobin said the mayor had told him the

guards would be withdrawn if the union promised no violence would result.

Two Are Arrested

In referring to the arrest earlier today of two Cleveland delegates, charged with wilfully and maliciously destroying property as a result of a beer bottle crashing through the window of the store at which teamsters are now striking, Tobin said:

"We don't believe in violence. We couldn't get ahead if we did. We have continually advised our members to refrain from violating the law, and shall continue to do so."

The men arrested were John T. O'Brien, teamsters' union official in Cleveland, and Anthony J. Pozum, delegate. They are held under \$5000 bond, along with J. E. Pomeroy, Portland taxi driver.

Tobin was re-elected president of the union today and Atlantic City was chosen as the site for the next convention five years hence.

Delegates today voted to allow the executive board continued freedom in supporting political parties and other causes with money.

A special train will take wives of delegates to the Pendleton Roundup early tomorrow.

The convention is scheduled to close Saturday.

CAMP ASSOCIATION URGES LATER FAIR

The Oregon State Fair Campers association, at its annual meeting passed the following resolution: "Resolved, that we, the campers of the Oregon state fair, in a usual convention, assembled, composed mostly of exhibitors and concessioners, favor holding the state fair the fourth Monday in September, and express ourselves as opposed to meeting at any time in August."

"This very week there are 8,000 people picking beans in Marion county locality, 25,000 persons picking hops in the same district, and 5,000 persons picking fruit, or 33,000 in three industries."

The state fair is maintained as an industrial proposition, but the holding of the fair in the summer time, deprives the farmer and his family of the benefits to be derived from attending this great industrial school."

BANKS HOLD MORE MONEY THAN EVER

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—(AP)—By recording the largest jump in several years, \$160,000,000, the Federal Reserve board reported today that member bank reserve balances reached the unprecedented height of \$5,388,000,000 during the week ended September 11. Making the greatest weekly increase in several years—\$160,000,000.

This total, the board estimated, was approximately \$2,838,000,000 in excess of legal requirements, which likewise marked the new high for this portfolio.

Monetary gold stocks of the nation continued their usual weekly gains, rising \$10,000,000 to total \$2,218,000,000, an amount \$1,250,000,000 higher than last year.

Plan March To See Why Vets Killed

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Royal W. Robertson, crippled ex-service man who was a leader of the bonus army which marched on Washington in 1932 issued a statement here today saying a new march of the veterans to demand a congressional investigation of the deaths of former service men in the Florida hurricane will be organized.

"We can prove that hesitation and lack of due regard for the welfare of the veterans in the camps on the Florida Keys resulted in their deaths," he said. Also "that had authorities moved promptly as they should have done in view of the weather reports all the veterans could have been saved."

Robertson said he and his associates plan to hold meetings here and in Los Angeles and other western cities and then move east, gathering their followers en route, to make a mass demand for a congressional inquiry.
