Luncheon reservations should be made with Mrs. C. C. Geer from Chemeketa chapter.

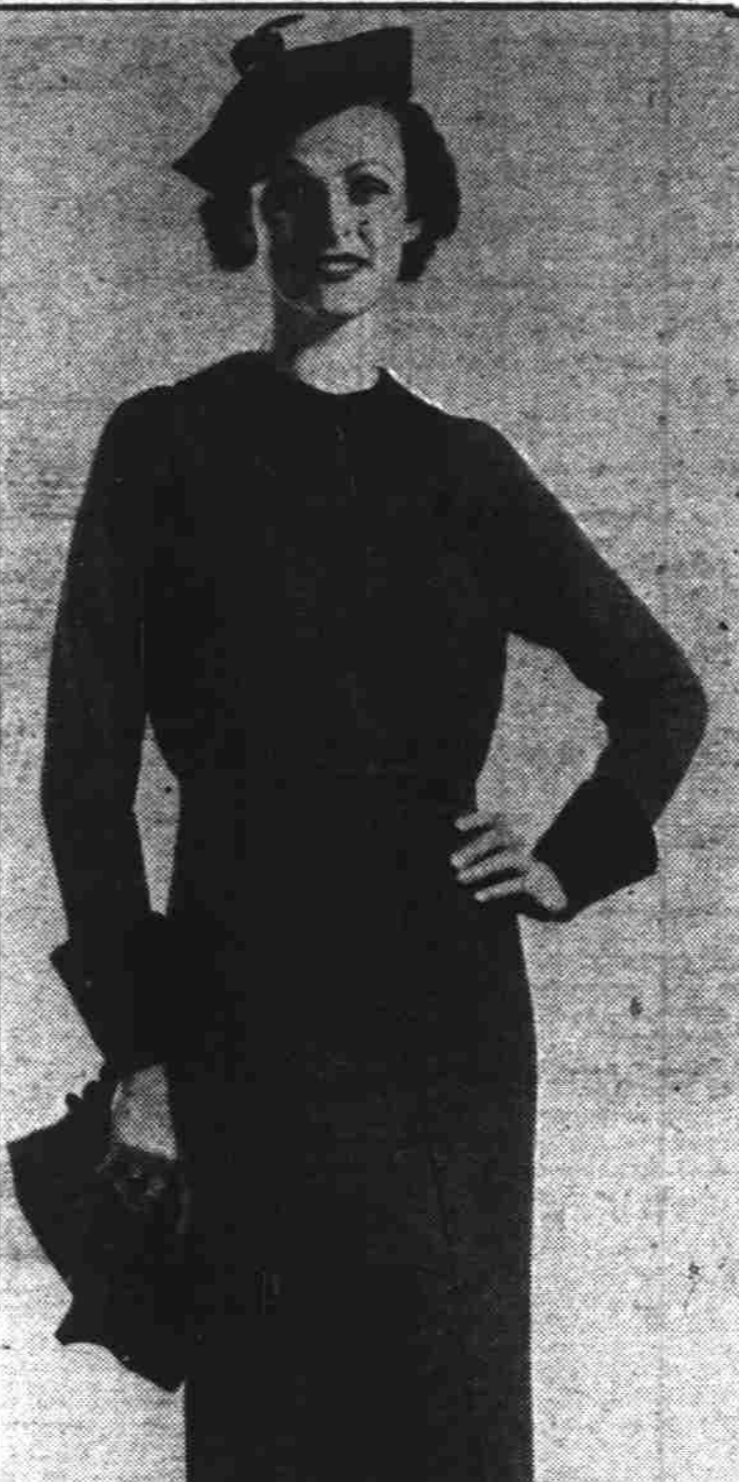
