

Inventory For State Planned

22 Persons to Take Part in This County; is WPA Project

Inventory of all state property under the direction of the state property control division will get under way in Marion county next Monday, Clifford Mudd, state property comptroller, announced Thursday.

The inventory is a work progress administration project and will cost approximately \$23,000. Twenty-two persons will be employed in the Marion county inventory, which will include capitol buildings, state institutions and equipment.

The Polk county inventory will start September 26 with five persons employed. Principal state property in Polk county is the normal school.

Eight persons will be employed in the Multnomah county inventory, which begins next Monday. The Wasco county inventory will begin October 1, with six persons on the job. State property there includes the Eastern Oregon state tuberculosis hospital.

Will Cover State Other inventories, segregated by counties, property involved, and number of employees, follow: Umatilla county, October 4. Eastern Oregon state hospital, seven employees.

Union county, October 7. Eastern Oregon normal school, eight employees.

Lane county, October 16, state university, 14 employees. Jackson county, October 21. Southern Oregon normal school, four employees.

Benton county, November 1. Oregon State college, 11 employees. The inventory must be completed within six months under the agreement with the federal government.

Battle for Louisiana Leadership Starts as Long Dies

Who will rule Louisiana now that the Kingfish Huey Long is dead? The state is a jumbled mass of politics and yet before the senator-dictator died, battle lines were drawn. Conferences were staged and observers point out that the following development may occur: Gov. O. K. Allen will resign, being succeeded by Lieut. Gov. James Noe, who

would then appoint Allen to the vacant senatorial post. Friends of Long who may play a part behind the scenes are Abe Shushan, millionaire merchant, said to have financed Long's early campaigns; Allen Ellender, speaker of the house, who desires to be governor, and Seymour Weiss, owner of a New Orleans hotel and chief chum of Long.

Extension School To Offer Courses

State to Conduct Classes at High School; Give College Credit

Regular university and college classes for which full credit will be given to those who complete them will again be offered in Salem evenings under the direction of the general extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education, it was announced here Thursday by Dr. Dan E. Clark, assistant director of the division. The classes which will be held in Salem high school will be open to all residents in and near Salem.

The courses will start September 30. Each will meet once a week for two hours and will carry two hours of college or university credit. At least five and possibly more classes in such subjects as English, education, history and public speaking will be offered.

Offer Shakespeare Included in the classes already tentatively arranged are those in Shakespeare to be taught by Margaret Clark, instructor in English of the general extension division; two courses in education, one to be conducted by Dr. H. B. Lasslett of Oregon State college and the other by Dr. C. L. Huffaker of the University of Oregon school of education; American national governments by Dr. Waldo Shumaker, professor of political science at the university; and extempore speaking to be conducted by W. A. Dahlberg of the university speech division.

Classes this fall promise to be unusually interesting, Dr. Clark says, and an even larger enrollment than last year is expected. Those wishing information on any of the courses may write to the general extension division of the University of Oregon at Eugene.

Deliverymen's Strike At Big Portland Store Settled, Announcement

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 19.—(AP)—Settlement of the strike which has involved 50 deliverymen at a large department store for the past seven weeks was announced late today.

Nether Aaron Frank, general manager of the store, nor H. W. Dall, business representative of the teamsters' district council, would commit themselves further than to say a "satisfactory settlement" had been reached and that about 50 men would return to their jobs tomorrow.

The teamsters' union had demanded a closed shop.

Laflar Services Set on Saturday

Funeral services for G. W. Laflar, active in the insurance and real estate business here for many years and who died shortly before noon yesterday at the family home, 1190 South Liberty, will be held Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from the Rigdon mortuary, with Rev. W. C. Kantner officiating.

Mr. Laflar had been in ill health for the past five years, following injuries sustained in an automobile accident at that time on the highway near Jefferson. His condition became so serious late Wednesday that his son, Arthur E. Laflar, was summoned from Portland. The son was here when Laflar passed away.

The Laflars came here from Iowa in 1911, he engaging at once in the real estate business. He was born in Griswold, Iowa, August 10, 1855, and later ran a country newspaper and the post office at Manning, Iowa. He was a Mason and member of the Eastern Star.

Surviving are the widow, Melissa H. Laflar, and the son, Arthur E.

Scribe Who Quit to be Political and Finance Figure, Dies at Age 63

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Robert Adamson, who left newspaper work to attain prominence in political and banking fields here, died suddenly in his office today. He was 63.

A native of Georgia and city editor of the Atlanta Constitution when he was 20, Adamson came to New York at the turn of the century and until 1919 was a political writer on the old "World." Later secretary to two mayors, manager of the campaign which in 1914 elected Mayor John Purroy Mitchel and a fusion government, and fire commissioner of New York for four years, in 1921 Mr. Adamson declined an invitation to seek the mayoralty.
