Today Mrs. Mooney said the hat in question was unfinished on the day of the explosion and that she wore it for the first time the following day.

He said Koenecke sat in the front of the plane beside him and soon after taking off had "grabbed the wheel and grabbed it hard."

Mulqueeny said he ordered Koenecke into the back seat immediately, and soon after the change in seats, looked around to see Davis and the ball player struggling. He said Davis yelled, "Help me, Bill. Give her the gun and get down out of here."

"I kicked the throttle as far down as it would go and started to look for a place to land," said Mulqueeny. "Davis was still yelling so I grabbed the extinguisher and let him have it. I don't know how many times I hit him, but it was three or four times at least. I put him out."
