

### Large Number Students New

#### Other States Furnish Big Share of Newcomers to Silverton

SILVERTON, Sept. 19.—An unusual number of new students, many from the midwest, have registered at the Silverton schools this past week. The total enrollment tabulated Thursday shows approximately 70 per cent of the attendance at hand. The remainder will come in when crop and fence harvest is completed. The senior high school has been greatly depleted by harvest, the registration numbering 204, about 55 per cent of normal. In the Eugene Field school (primary) the registration is 419 with another 20 per cent expected within the next week or two. Junior high school totals 260.

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### W. Knight Resigns As Douglas Solon

William Knight resigned Thursday as state representative from Douglas county. He recently was appointed deputy district attorney there. Knight's successor will be elected by the Douglas county court next Monday. The court also will elect a successor to Senator Walter Fisher, who was held ineligible to serve in an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle. Fisher was disqualified from serving as state senator because of being a member of the state bonus commission. He later resigned from the commission and reports from Roseburg indicate that he may be elected to succeed himself as senator. The secretary of state fixed the date for electing Knight's successor.
