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Public Health Group Gathers

Seven-County Association Leaders Talk Seal Sale For Coming Season

An enthusiastic organization meeting of public health associations from seven neighboring counties was held at the chamber of commerce Friday with the Marion county association the host group.

Mrs. Saldie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the state association, arranged the program for which Frederick D. Hopkins, executive secretary of the National Tuberculosis Association, was the principal speaker.

The purpose of the gathering was to prepare for the Christmas seal drive which opens the day after Thanksgiving, November 29, and to confer with Mr. Hopkins who is touring the country.

Countries represented at yesterday's gathering were Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Polk, Tillamook, Marion and Linn.

After the morning session the group adjourned to the Quella for luncheon. Short talks were given by Miss Blanche Runels of Jackson county, W. I. Van Loan of Lane, Mrs. C. I. Winnick of Tillamook county, Mrs. Charles Ferrier of Douglas, Mrs. A. E. Utley of Polk, Mrs. Ferris of Benton, Mrs. Jake Werle of Marion, Dr. V. A. Douglas, Dr. G. C. Bellinger and Mr. Hopkins.

Miss L. Grace Holmes, state statistician of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, spoke at the afternoon meeting and quoted figures to the death rate due to work done by funds raised through the sale of Christmas seals.

Fifty years ago, every 100th home in the United States had a case of tuberculosis and the disease was ranked first in causes of death. It is now seventh in causes, Miss Holmes pointed out.
