2 Bound Over After Hearing

Case Against Otto Schlack is Dismissed After Troubles Aired

SILVERTON, Sept. 26.—(Special) — Justice court chambers were crowded beyond capacity today for hearings growing out of an episode last week on the farm three and a half miles south of Silvertown which Otto Schlack is leasing from J. Hartwell and his wife, Mrs. H. B. Hartwell.

Outcome of the hearings: Otto Schlack, accused of assault and battery in complaint made by Mrs. M. B. Hartwell, was freed. Mrs. Frances Schlack, accused of assault and battery on complaint made by Mrs. Hartwell, held to answer to the grand jury. Out on \$100 bail. J. Hartwell, accused of pointing a gun, with Otto Schlack the complaining witness, waived preliminary hearing and bound over to the grand jury. Out on \$250 bail.

Scores Both Sides Judge Frank Alfred before whom the hearing was held at one point scored both sides for excessive contradictory evidence. The trouble arose over a water pipe line which Mrs. Schlack testified Hartwells had tried to turn off. The Schlacks further claimed that something had been put in the water and testified that Mrs. Hartwell had said this substance was lime. Schlack, so the testimony ran, was so ill as result of drinking the water he had to consult a doctor. Neither of the Hartwells testified on this matter.

At one point, Hartwell testified Mrs. Schlack declared during the altercation "I hate you and I'll kill you." All admitted Mrs. Schlack tore off Mrs. Hartwell's glasses during the fight. Joseph Pelton represented the district attorney's office at the hearing, and John Eayne the Schlacks.
