

Washburne Resigns as Member of State Highway Commission

Successor is Being Talked

Touville, Marsters Given Mention; Eugene Mar's Service is Lauded

Carl Washburne of Eugene, who has been a member of the state highway commission since early in the meter administration, submitted his resignation to Governor Martin on Monday. The resignation was said to have been based on personal reasons.

Washburne was appointed a member of the commission to succeed Senator Charles K. Spaulding of Salem, who resigned. Other members are Henry F. Cabell of Portland, chairman, and Ed Aldrich, Pendleton newspaper publisher. Washburne is a republican.

Frank Touville of Medford, ex-judge of Jackson county, builder of the original grade over the Oregon side of the Siskiyou mountains, was mentioned prominently as a successor to Washburne. The name of A. C. Marsters, Roseburg banker, also was discussed.

Washburne's service was praised by Governor Martin. In a letter released Monday afternoon, commended Washburne on his splendid administration. It read in part:

"When last January you first expressed a desire to retire from the commission I urged you to remain in order that the commission might have the benefit of your wide experience and understanding of highway matters, gained as a member of the commission during some three years of service.

"The program then in mind has been firmly established. Under the circumstances I am accepting your resignation as a member of the commission effective when your successor has qualified.

"May I take this opportunity to congratulate you on the fine record of public service made by you as a member of this important public body. The state government could not continue to function without the loyal and devoted efforts of such public spirited citizens as yourself.

"I want at this time also to express to you my deep personal regard, and to assure you of my appreciation of your generous support of my administration. I hope that my efforts will continue to merit your confidence and support."

Prisoner Escapes Here or in Eugene

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(P)—Albert del Guercio, Los Angeles immigration officer, reported today that Lloyd B. Stevens, a prisoner with whom he was en route to the Canadian border, had escaped during the train trip north, probably at Eugene.

Discovery of the escape was not made until the train reached Salem.

Stevens occupied a berth of Dr. E. Kurlish of the Los Angeles public health service, and is believed to have escaped through a window while the doctor was asleep.

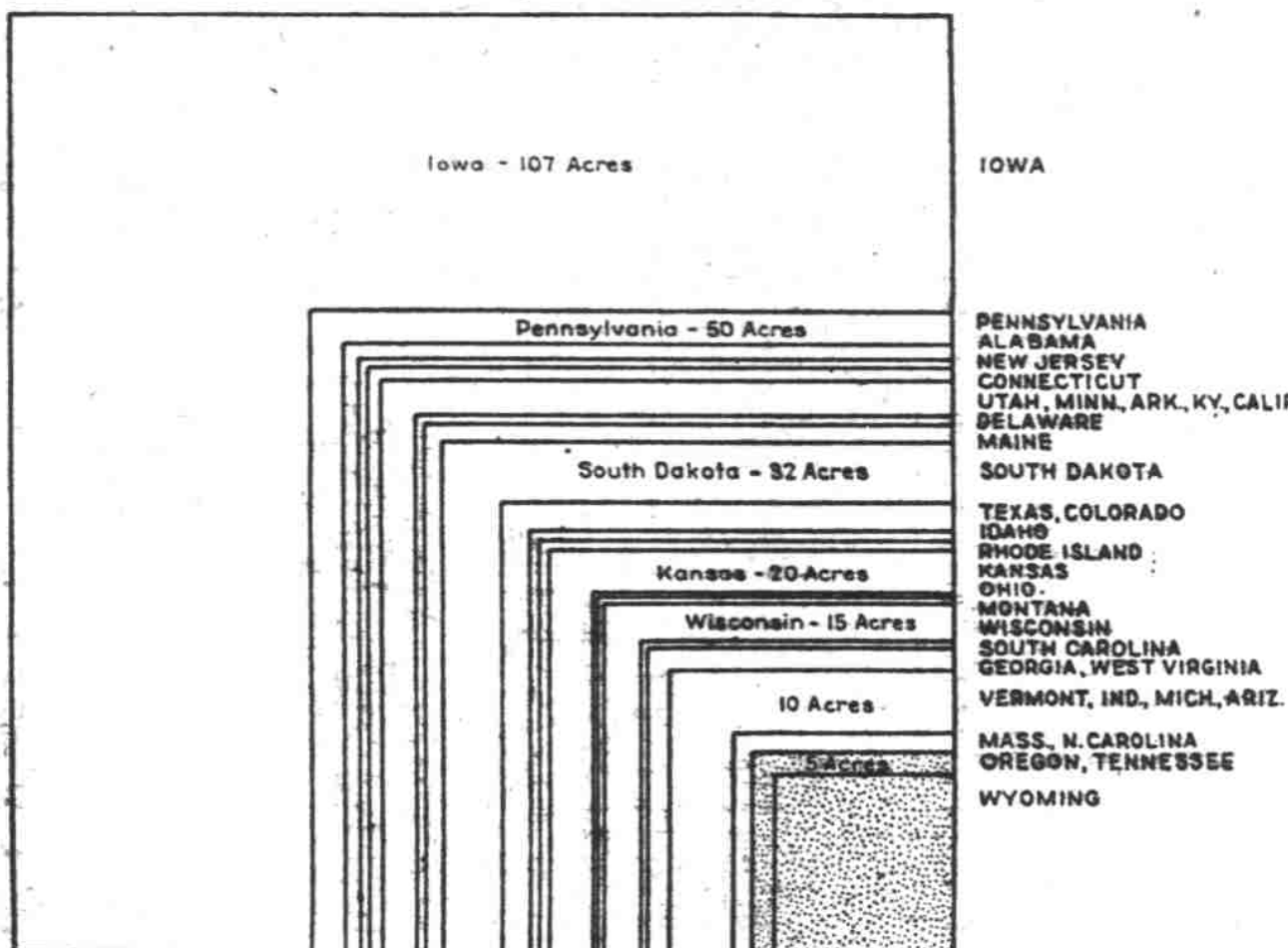
Customs Collections Double Those of 1933

Only Wyoming Has Smaller Capitol Site Than Oregon



Of thirty-three states in the United States recently answering inquiries as to size of capitol grounds, twenty report adding more land. Wyoming's plot of four acres is smallest in the country and they are adding more land, officials from that state announced. Actual size of the Oregon site on which the former capitol stood is 331 by 680 feet. Application for 45 per cent of \$3,500,000 set as the amount needed for building a new state house for Oregon was recently approved by the United States Government. A supplemental application has been made to PWA asking for aid in obtaining additional ground. States adding more land and their present sizes follow: Arizona, 10; Michigan, 10; Georgia, 11 1/4; Idaho, 22; Arkansas, 40; Indiana, 10; Massachusetts, 6; Montana, 15 1/2; Ohio, 16; Pennsylvania, 50; Rhode Island, 21; South Carolina, 12; Utah, 40; Wisconsin, 15; Virginia, 11 1/4; Tennessee, 3 1/4; Vermont, 10; North Carolina, 6; Wyoming, 4. Average size site for the 48 states is 25 1/2 acres.

As secretary of the interior, Mr. Ickes presided over the brief exercises on the rock hewn abutment high above the Colorado and far below the towering precipitous rocks above.

He did not specify the other three but it was assumed he referred to the Grand Coulee and Bonneville dams in the Columbia river in the northwest; the Tennessee valley experiment in the southwest; and the proposed St. Lawrence waterways development in the northeast.

"These great government power projects," he said, "will affect not only the development of agriculture and industry and mining in the sections they serve, but they will also prove useful yardsticks to measure the cost of power throughout the United States.

"It is my belief that the government should proceed to lay down the first yardstick from this great power plant in the form of a state power line assisted in its financing by the government and tapping the wonderful natural resources of southern Nevada."

Slash in Spending Demanded by King

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(P)—A big slash in the emergency spending, a balanced budget in 1936, and a rigid fight against forces which tend to socialize the nation were demanded tonight by Senator King (Utah) ranking democrat of the senate finance committee.

Speaking in the radio forum conducted by the Washington Evening Star, the senator, usually a staunch administration adherent, asserted that a "sound fiscal policy" should be adopted and that higher taxes could be avoided by holding the government to its "proper sphere" and keeping to the pledges of the democratic 1932 platform.

Reports Filed on Bank Liquidations

Department Shows Status of Five Institutions in Marion County

Reports of receipts and disbursements from late in June to the middle of September of five banks in Marion county in process of liquidation were filed with the county clerk yesterday by the state banking department.

Report on the bank of Stayton shows cash on hand in the commercial department of \$4221.57 and in the savings department, \$4241.01 on September 14, with commercial disbursements since June 29, reaching \$24,982.84 of which \$21,590.43 was dividend to depositors; and distributions of \$13,839.70 in the savings department, with \$12,286.34 covered in the dividend.

For the Bank of Woodburn, the report shows cash balances of \$3109.96 and \$5673.33 in the commercial and savings departments, respectively. On the commercial side, disbursements were \$39,919.80, with \$28,750.44 paid out in dividends; and on the savings side, disbursements were \$1316.86.

The Aurora state bank showed cash balances of \$6899.22 in commercial and \$2413.97 in savings deposits. The State Bank of Hubbard had \$4939.15 cash balance in savings and \$5567.44 in the commercial department. Commercial department cash balance for the State Bank of Scotts Mills was \$1349.32 and the savings department, \$236.37.

New Issue Raised In Wharf Dispute

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.—(P)—Longshoremen resumed work on the San Francisco waterfront today after an "unfair" cargo ban was lifted by affiliated unions but a new controversy over the "hiring hall," burning issue of last year's coast strike, threatened renewed trouble.

In a letter to the Waterfront Employers association, Harry Bridges, president of the San Francisco local of the International Longshoremen's association, charged hiring was being carried on outside the jointly-controlled hall, from which the men are dispatched to work.

Bridges declared this was a violation of the award agreement made by a federal mediation board in last year's strike. The award set up the hall, to be controlled jointly by the employers and the I.L.A.

Power District is Asked in Petition

Steps leading toward the formation of a proposed hydroelectric district in Marion county for construction of power and light plants, sale and transmission of self-generated and purchased energy to commercial, industrial and general consumers were taken yesterday with the filing of petitions with County Clerk Boyer. The petitions carry 20 names headed by Anna M. Wallace, Butteville.

The petitioners state that they are residents of territory not in cities or towns but wish to join with the municipalities of Sublimity, Stayton, Silverton, Scotts Mills, Salem, St. Paul, Mt. Angel, Jefferson, Hubbard, Gervais, Donald, Aurora, and Aumsville to form a people's utility district under state law.

The petition requests that the hydroelectric commission of the state make preliminary surveys as to the possibility and advisability of creating such a public utility district of the county.

Officers said tonight a bloody shotgun reported tossed from a car that sped through Westport, Ore., yesterday afternoon was the most tangible clue yet obtained.

Weapon Is Thrown From Similar Car

The weapon, according to a report by J. F. Eastham of Westport, was thrown from an automobile with a green body and red wheels that passed through the town about 2:30 p. m. In the shotgun's stock was a bullet hole apparently made by a .32 or .38 calibre bullet. Dust from the speeding machine obscured the license on the car, Eastham said.

Multnomah county commissioners, at the request of Sheriff Martin P. Pratt, today offered a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest of the suspects.

Captain Wayne Gurdane of the Oregon state police said he had abandoned the angle that the men sought might have been those who were reported by E. A. Garner of Vancouver, Wash., to have kidnapped him and forced him to drive south through Oregon. Garner at Grants Pass, Oregon, told officers the men had compelled him to drive to Eugene, Ore., where they assertedly abandoned his car and took another to continue their trip south. Garner said he was finally put out of the car and tied to a tree at Merlin, north of Grants Pass.

All Shells for One Gun, Decided

An autopsy today was followed by a report from Dr. Warren C. Hunter and Dr. Frank R. Menne that the deputy had more than 300 shot pellets in his body.

Stanley McDonald of the Multnomah county identification bureau said that an examination of the three shells found near Loll's body showed they had been fired from the same gun.

The coroner's office reported that at least two sizes of shot had been found in the autopsy.

Carrie V. Moores Dies in Portland

Miss Carrie Virginia Moores, native of Salem, and a resident of Portland for 40 years, died at her home there yesterday.

She was born in Salem, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Moores, Oregon pioneers. Her parents crossed the plains from Illinois and settled in Salem, where they became prominent in the civic and social life of the city. They owned the Moores block, present location of the United States National bank, and operated a general merchandise store. Miss Moores, youngest member of her family, was born shortly after her family settled in this community.

She was a sister of the late Charles B. and A. N. Moores and Miss Bertha Moores. Mrs. Gertrude Wells, of Salem, is a niece, as is also Mrs. Althea Kinney of Astoria. Nephews are Merrill, Chester and Ralph Moores, all of Portland, Kenneth Moores of Seattle and Guy C. Miller of Palo Alto, Calif.

Weather Spoils Stratosphere Attempt Again

RAPID CITY, S. D., Sept. 30.—(P)—Unfavorable weather conditions today forced delay in the third stratosphere flight attempt by Captains Albert W. Stevens and Orville E. Anderson, leaving the takeoff date in doubt. Officials at the National Geographic Society-Army Air Corps expedition base announced there was no possibility of flight Tuesday.

Government Loses on AAA Injunction Dismissal

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 30.—(P)—Federal Judge Luther B. Way, later today dismissed a motion by the United States to dissolve 24 temporary injunctions he had granted 24 manufacturers, restraining Collector of Internal Revenue M. B. Early from collecting processing taxes under the agricultural adjustment administration. To judge the law's preliminary decision is upheld and the AAA act ultimately declared unconstitutional it will mean the saving of many millions of dollars to the 24 companies involved.

Five Men Sought for Slaying of Racketeer

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(P)—Five underworld characters were hunted tonight by police for questioning in the double murder of a racketeer and his chauffeur in a Brooklyn garage today. Reminiscent of the St. Valentine's day massacre in Chicago years ago, the double killing was executed by three men who lined up their victims, Joseph Amberg, 40, and Norris Kessler, a chauffeur, against a garage wall in Brooklyn's Brownsville section and then mowed them down with six bullets.

Pedestrian Fatally Injured by Train

TACOMA, Sept. 30.—(P)—Struck by a Northern Pacific train this afternoon near Murray station, August Johnson, 59, believed to be a Tacoma cook, was fatally injured. He died in a Fort Lewis hospital soon after the accident. Trainmen reported the victim was walking on the tracks when overtaken by the train, and failed to heed warning signals.

Cuban Schooner Aground in Florida Keys

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(P)—Coast guard headquarters was advised tonight that a Cuban schooner, the Calarna, was aground in the Florida Keys, in the vicinity of Hudson. A patrol boat and the cutter Vigilant, out of Jacksonville, were reported en route to lend assistance.

Accused Broker Goes to Cash Check, Disappears

SEATTLE, Sept. 30.—(P)—D. W. Dawes, 32-year-old securities broker, charged with grand larceny, escaped from a deputy sheriff in a business district cafe today while permitted to leave full temporarily to cash a check. He had been in jail in lieu of \$60,000 property bond.

Airplane Salesman Crash Victim; Fog Blamed

EUREKA, Calif., Sept. 30.—(P)—Creswell C. Cole, 28, of San Mateo, a salesman for the Fairchild Airplane Co. of San Francisco, was killed instantly today when his plane crashed into the side of a hill five miles northeast of here. A heavy fog blanketing the coast was blamed for the crash, which occurred 15 minutes after Cole took off from a local flying field, en route to Orleans, where he planned to fish. He was traveling alone. The gasoline tank of the plane exploded as the ship crashed into the hillside.

Countess Barbara's Cousin Deported from Italy

ROME, Sept. 30.—(P)—Italian police disclosed tonight that James "Jimmy" Donohue, gay young cousin of Barbara, Countess Haugwitz-Reventlow, paid for his fun in shouting "Viva Ethiopia" at a fascist demonstration by taking an escorted trip to the French border. The gendarmes said young Donohue was accompanied by two detectives to the border on last night's Paris express train while the countess, heiress to 5-and-10 cent store millions in America, remained in Rome.

Roosevelt Taken On Perilous Ride

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Sept. 30.—(P)—President Roosevelt returned to his special train an hour late tonight after a hazardous experience in which his car was forced to turn around by backing near the edge of a mountain precipice.

The incident happened when Senator Pittman, of Nevada, driving with the President and Mrs. Roosevelt, suggested a tour of a new road up the side of Mt. Charleston, 20 miles away. The road constructed by CCC boys developed to be a one-way road still not completed. Finally at a curve it was decided to attempt to turn around. There was a little cut in the inner wall which provided a little more room.

The President's car budged back into this cut, then was driven straight for the edge of the road below which yawned a pit which showed no bottom visible from the roadside.

It stopped about a foot away from the edge, backed and then went forward again. Another

The message reported the passengers and men of the crew had been transferred early tonight with their baggage from the Ariguanai in four motor boats of the Rotterdam.

The prow of the Rotterdam was stuck fast on a reef off the coast of Jamaica. It was said, and would present extreme difficulties if attempts were made to refloat the vessel.
