

Adequate Site for Oregon's New Capitol Edifice is Held Vital

Experience of Kentucky Cited

Building Designed For Old Site at Frankfort is Found Too Large

Adequacy of ground is vital to proper setting of the new Oregon state capitol, "though the taxpayer rightly sees no need of trying to outdo other states in size and cost of building," H. A. Whitney, Portland architect, declares in a letter to The Statesman about the capitol situation.

Whitney points out that the old site seems too small "even to contain an adequate building to say nothing about surrounding grounds," and recites the experience of other states to declare:

Average 33 Acres

"It is not necessary for Oregon to excel other states either in size or grounds or cost of building, but there is no reason why we should fall far behind such average. The average acreage of state capitol grounds where buildings have been built during the last 40 years is 33 acres, while one capitol has 107 acres. The least expensive capitols are those of North Dakota and Oklahoma, costing about \$2,000,000 each, while the average cost is over \$2,500,000. Under present conditions, the average cost would be over \$4,000,000.

"Increased size of ground does not necessarily mean increased cost of building."

Dome or Tower?

Whitney refers to the approaching legislative session to select the capitol site and building, and writes, "The press, rightly or wrongly, seems to maintain a neutral stand in the discussion, but the layman's is anything but neutral. He is rabid for the old site or equally opinionated in the desirability for a new site. He is sure a typical capitol building with a dome is the only thing, or he is just as certain that a tower building would be the perfect solution. Let us consider a few examples.

"Only three capitols of the tower type have been built so far. The North Dakota capitol, a severely plain office building with a dome is the only thing, or he is just as certain that a tower building would be the perfect solution. Let us consider a few examples.

"All the other state capitols built in the last 40 years are small copies of the capitol at Washington... the new capitol of West Virginia is 300 by 600 feet, not including flanking buildings, and is but little larger than the average. The Nebraska capitol is 434 feet square at the base and is in the center of a block 500 feet square. This is just three times the size of the old site at Salem, which is 300 by 700 feet. It would seem that the old site is too small even to contain an adequate building, to say nothing about surrounding grounds.

Kentucky Cited

"When Kentucky decided to build a new capitol, the same controversy arose as to the adequacy of the old site. Sentiment for the old site combined with economy won out and the legislature voted to rebuild on the old location. When the plans for the new capitol were finished it was found that the building would overlap the property lines and it was necessary to call a special session of the legislature to purchase a new site. Thirty three acres were then purchased and Frankfort boasts of a capitol and grounds far above the average."

Whitney is with the firm of Sutton, Whitney and Aandahl, architects.

Seattle Flour Mill Men Walk Out

SEATTLE, Oct. 2.—(P)—About 60 men on the night shift at the Fisher Flouring mills on Harbor Island walked out on strike tonight. Police were called to the plant but reported there was no disturbance, although the strikers congregated outside the mill. An unofficial spokesman for the strikers said the strike was the culmination of dissatisfaction extending back for two and a half years with members of the flour and cereal workers union and the warehousemen's union, but declined to state what demands of the strikers were.

Weather Favors Selassie

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 2.—(P)—The weather gods seemed to favor Ethiopia tonight. Skies were sodden and intermittent rains continued, making flying difficult, bogging down roads and delaying military transport. The bad weather affects the Italians more seriously than it does the warriors of Haile Selassie, because the latter are far more mobile, depending for transport almost entirely on men and mules. The Italians, on the other hand, rely considerably on motors and airplanes.

Oregon Gets \$13,489,420, Relief

PORTLAND, Oct. 2.—(P)—Figures gathered by the Oregonian's Washington correspondent showed that Oregon had received \$13,489,420 in federal funds, not including money for CCC, river and harbors projects or highway funds. WPA projects aggregated \$7,408,528; PWA projects \$4,505,882; capitol grant \$1,575,000.

Oldest Episcopal Bishop Dies

SWANEE, Tenn., Oct. 3.—(Thursday)—(P)—The Rt. Rev. Thomas Frank Gailor, oldest bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church in this country and chancellor of the University of the South, died here early today. He was 79 years old.

Italy Reports 30 More Killed

ROME, Oct. 2.—(P)—Italy's casualty list in East Africa for September was 28 soldiers and two officers, bringing the deaths in military ranks thus far to 160, official announcement said today. Thirty-eight workmen died of various causes in September.

Washington Bars Oregon Steelhead

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 2.—(P)—Whether it is lawful to sell Oregon steelhead trout in Washington was an issue raised in justice court at Montesano today in a case brought by the state game commission against Gus Strand of the Strand Fisheries, Inc., Aberdeen.

The game commission contended it is illegal to sell steelhead in Washington, though caught in another state, while the defendant claimed interstate commerce laws make such sales legal when the fish are shipped into Washington from another state.

Steelhead are classed as a game fish in Washington.

Justice of the Peace Arthur Furnia withheld a ruling until written briefs are submitted by attorneys.

The game commission stopped the Strand fisheries in shipping 900 pounds of Oregon steelhead to eastern markets.

Martin Named on Rogers Committee

Governor Martin yesterday received a telegram from Vice-President Garner asking him to serve as honorary state chairman of the Will Rogers memorial committee.

The purpose of the memorial, the telegram read, was to allow thousands of citizens of the United States to perpetuate the name of the famous humorist and screen star.

The location and character of the memorial has not yet been determined, the telegram read.

All other states have been requested to participate in the memorial program.

State Group Planned

Governor Martin said he would appoint a state-wide memorial committee within the next few days.

"I imagine they have permits to operate logging trucks on the road," Mr. Hubbs reported last night. But they had no permit from us to string the cables or to load on the road. They thought that the cables were high enough not to interfere."

Mr. Hubbs reported "that all were willing to comply with the law but the situation had not arisen before, and since the road was there, the loggers had just decided to use it."

"A committee was named to formulate articles of incorporation under existing state laws to be filed within a few days with the state corporation commissioner, and then work out by-laws covering details of the program. The provisions of these proposed by-laws are, of course, as yet indefinite, but will be worked upon by the committee and a definite program will be announced in the very near future."

"The prune harvest is about completed and the movement of prunes will soon begin, and it was the thought of those attending the meeting that prune growers of Oregon would welcome the announcement that ways and means were being formulated to enable an orderly means of marketing their prunes."

"It was evident at the meeting that the members of the prune control board were determined to carry on and fight for improved conditions in the production and marketing of Oregon prunes."

RFC Loan Coming To Salem Mills

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mittee of three persons sent from Oregon to Washington, D. C., to appeal for aid for the flax industry, reported at a meeting in Salem that a high official of the department of agriculture had said: Oregon Flax Said Finest in America

"Oregon flax is the finest produced in America and is second to none in the world."

The three persons who were sent to Washington to support appeals for funds with which to construct several plants as well as to "sell" Oregon flax to eastern buyers, included Mrs. W. W. Gabriell, Portland, Mrs. W. S. Nicholson, Marshfield, and E. G. Robinson, representing the Portland chamber of commerce. The two women represented the state federation of flax growers.

A memorial supporting the appeal was passed by both houses of the state legislature last spring. Two months ago Governor Charles H. Martin named a state flax board, consisting of Walter W. R. May, H. H. Chindgren, Mrs. W. R. Gabriel, L. L. Laws, E. G. Robinson, Frank Chambers and Fletcher Linn. The board was designed to act in an advisory capacity in assisting the industry as a whole.

Details of the loan to the Salem firm and possible future steps to aid the industry in this state have not been made known.

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member "suggesting" to Weston that the latter shoot. He said he fired at the deputy only once after the officer had "aimed his gun at me and I heard a click." He said he believed Loll was firing at him. Pair Traced Through Their Automobile

The two boys were traced through their automobile, a resident of the district having seen it speed from the scene of the killing. Detectives learned this morning the two had headed for the Grays Harbor, Wash., area. Fiedler and Weston were captured without a struggle. Several hundred persons had gathered at the courthouse here to witness their arrival. There was no disorder. Sheriff Martin T. Price had declared "the slaying of Deputy Loll was one of the most brutal I ever have encountered."

Both accused youths said they had been hunting pheasants on the lonely Stevenson road near Portland. Deputy Loll went there in quest of them after a resident of the area had complained. A few minutes later his body was found in the dusty road. Thirteen shotgun charges had crashed through his body.

Deputy District Attorney Price questioned Weston first. An angular youth with a mop of dark hair over sharp features, he talked rapidly and earnestly. Fiedler, much smaller, more nervous, but less serious, paused for minutes before answering any question, then quibbled with the prosecutor over details. Each said he was "considering" returning from clips today to surrender and "tell you fellows everything."

Old Injuries, Averred

Fiedler was seriously injured in an automobile accident a year ago in which he suffered a skull fracture. Weston told Deputy Price that since that time has had "madman streaks," and that "when his eyes get glassy I'm afraid of him." Such a condition prevailed, Weston said, when Fiedler assertedly commanded that he fire his shotgun at Deputy Sheriff Loll as the latter lay mortally wounded in the dust.

Not more than an hour after their capture in the Grays Harbor country today, the Multnomah county grand jury returned first degree murder indictments against Fiedler and Weston.
