There are many details as to grades of materials, room arrangements and special equipment for inclusion in the specifications which the architects will prepare yet this month. Definite reports may be ready on sites for the new grade school on Mission street between Park and Lincoln schools, which it will supplant, and on land at 14th and D street needed for the new senior high plant.
