

Hauptmann Death Sentence is Upheld by High New Jersey Court

Judges' Vote Is Unanimous

Three Doubtful Lanes of Escape Left; Appeal is Planned

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 9.—(AP)—The death sentence, imposed on Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the kidnap-murder of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., was unanimously upheld today by the court of errors and appeals, leaving him only three very doubtful avenues of escape from the electric chair.

Supreme Court Justice Thomas W. Trenchard, will fix a new execution date for Hauptmann and unless his lawyers successfully pursue one of the three courses open, the stoical German carpenter will pay the penalty decreed at Flemington by a jury of eight men and four women.

13 Judges Agree
The 13 members of the court who voted to sustain the Flemington verdict swept aside every one of the legal points raised by Hauptmann's counsel, held that the trial was legally proper in every respect, and concluded that the verdict was "one of which the evidence inescapably led."

For the first time since he was arrested in the Bronx on September 19, 1934, Hauptmann today manifested anything approximating despair. His present chief of counsel, C. Lloyd Fisher, broke the news to him in the death house.

"I never did this and surely they will find that out before it is too late," Hauptmann told Fisher. His first words, though, indicated a regard for his wife, Anna's, feelings.

"My God, what a fine anniversary present for Anna," he exclaimed. The Hauptmanns will have been married ten years tomorrow.

Bruno Recovers Calm
After the first shock, prison officials said, Hauptmann quickly recovered his customary calm and relaxed in the cell, the walls of which are liberally plastered with pictures of his wife and son, Manfred.

Hauptmann's three forlorn hopes to beat death now are:

1. An appeal to the United States supreme court on the grounds his constitutional rights were invaded at the trial.

2. An appeal to the court of pardons of New Jersey to com-

Three Retting, Scutching Plants May be Built With Federal Aid

to supply work or relief for the unemployed and the money would be turned over to some county in the district which had used up its full allotment or not utilized at all.

Plants Will Double Flax Fibre Output
Production of Oregon flax fibre—raw material for the manufacture of linen products—will be doubled after erection of the three retting and scutching plants listed as finally approved for a WPA grant of \$53,524. At present, only one plant is in operation, producing 150 tons of flax fibre annually. One of the plants will be located at Eugene while location of the other two has not definitely been decided.

Machinery for the three plants, costing about \$10,000 apiece, will be paid for by the communities or cooperatives which operate them. It may be possible to obtain government loans to buy the machinery.

31 Licenses Taken Away in September For Drunk Driving

License revocations during the past month for driving while intoxicated totaled 31, Secretary of State Snell reported yesterday. Two others were revoked for hit and run driving while two were revoked for physical disabilities.

In addition, the secretary of state reported 18 suspensions of which 13 were for reckless driving. Courts in the state reported 397 convictions for traffic violations during September.

Mrs. J. C. Siegmund has recovered sufficiently to visit a short time each day with her husband, but remains in the hospital.

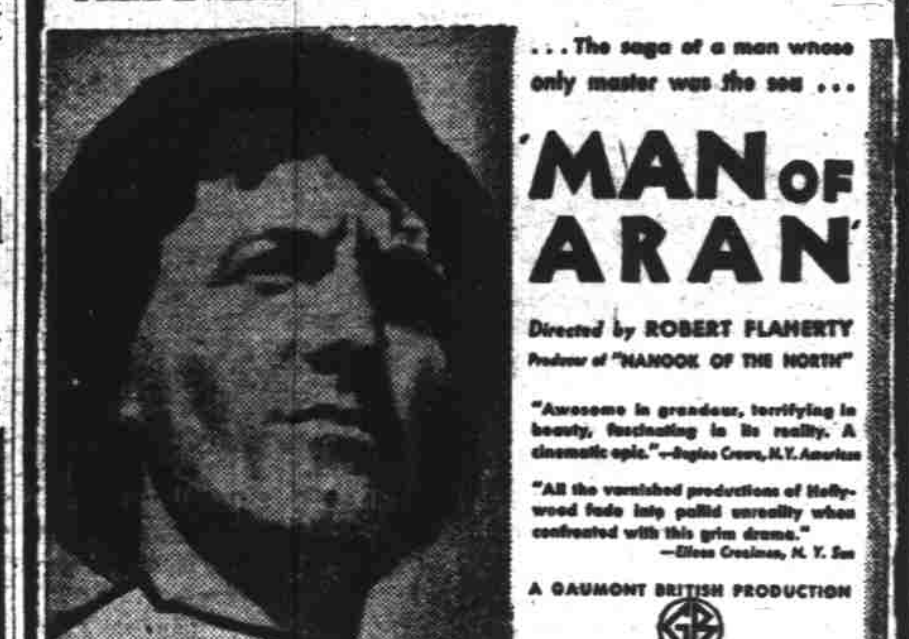
