Vetoed Bills Face Session

25 Must Be Brought Up at Special Gathering of Solons Next Week

When organization of the special session of the legislature, convening October 31, is completed, that body will have before it the largest group of vetoed bills that have been before a legislative session in more than a decade. These vetoed bills, together with the veto message of the governor must by law be presented to the session for its consideration...

Heading the list are senate bills 404 and 153. The first is the much discussed power bill, substituted for the grange bill, which provided for the creation of a state power district under the direction of a commission with authority to build power lines and sell either wholesale or retail power.

Also on the list will be senate bill 359 providing that the attorney-general do all the law work of the state except when specially qualified attorneys were needed for departmental work, in which case the attorney general and the department were to agree upon a suitable appointee. This bill was vetoed after being given what was considered administration approval.

Upset Price Issue - Others of importance are senate bills 178 and 179 allowing circuit courts to set minimum prices for property sold under mortgage foreclosure, house bill 355 permitting a tax levy in Multnomah county for the redemption of scrip issued during the depression and senate bill 325 providing for the refund of license fees to motor vehicle owners when the vehicle was destroyed before 50 per cent of the license period had expired.

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Grangers Approve Council's Action

Salem Members Favor Old Location of Capitol Unanimously

Salem grange No. 17, in session yesterday at Miller's hall went on record commending the recent action of the Salem council in passing an ordinance outlawing various gambling devices, and also favoring repeal of the present Oregon syndicalism law.

The grangers voted unanimously that the state capitol should be rebuilt on the same ground, but not on the same foundation. They favor using a part or all the land belonging to the old capitol site.

Exceptions to California concerns canning Oregon products and labeling and selling as California products were taken by the grange.

Elderly Chinese Asks for Relief - Luo Sing, 59, Chinese, and resident of Marion county for 29 years, filed application Saturday for relief with a federal agency here.

Sing once was wealthy. He owned a large hop yard and his friends said he was the principal stockholder in the Oregon hotel, at Broadway and Stark streets, Portland.

The Chinese applied for relief in the face of the fact that a group of his countrymen recently raised a fund to take him back to China. "I don't want to return to China," Sing said. "I came to San Francisco when a boy and the Pacific coast is my home."

When Sing first arrived in Oregon he worked grubbing stumps. He later accumulated some money with which he purchased a hop yard and made other investments. He lost his Portland property a number of years ago.

Sing is the only Chinese, as far as is known, to seek a place on the relief rolls here.

Needs of Shelton Ditch are Studied - The special city council committee on Shelton ditch improvements has walked the length of the flood control project from the penitentiary dam into the city limits accompanied by engineers who explained further work needed, Alderman E. E. Perrine, chairman, said last night, and expects to meet Monday to consider cost estimates now being prepared.

Other committees are Alderman Carl B. Armpriest and W. D. Evans. Engineers who outlined the project to them include City Engineer Hugh Rogstad and his assistant, J. Harold Davis; S. W. Richardson, WPA district project supervisor, and R. D. Cooper, engineer in the WPA office. Cooper superintended work done on the project last winter.

Chief improvements held needed are concrete diversion works at the juncture of Mill creek and Shelton ditch and construction on wings and aprons of the 21st street bridge across the ditch to speed the flow of water.
