Basler Brings Tricky Eleven

Man-in-Motion Attack and "Wolf Pack" Defense to Worry Willamette

Faced with the toughest game of their conference schedule, the Willamette Bearcats will speed up practices this week in order to be ready to stop the diversified offensive that Coach Loren Basler's College of Idaho team is expected to use against them next Saturday night on Sweetland field.

The Coyotes, co-champions with Willamette of the Northwest conference last year, are a veteran team and are said to have one of the best offenses of any small college in the northwest.

Fathoming Basler's peculiar new offense which calls for a backfield man in motion on every offensive play and his just as peculiar "Wolf pack" defense in which groups or pairs of players work together will be the major problem of the Bearcats this week.

Intensification of drill is started. "Spec" Keene began intensification of drill last Friday when he put the Bearcats through their first scrimmage since the Washington State game. Results were satisfactory as the first string tore through the scrubs with greater effectiveness than at any time previously this season.

The Bearcat offense showed evidence of the polishing Keene and his assistants did during the week as gaping holes were opened in the second string line, pass plays worked to perfection and on defense the second string backs were stopped cold.

Possibility that the team will reach its peak too early is Keene's only worry this week. With most of the squad recuperated from injuries and illnesses and ready for hard work Keene will work the Bearcats mercilessly this week.

Fear of the Coyotes' dangerous aerial attack will prompt heavy work on the Bearcat pass defense. Against Eastern Oregon Normal the Coyotes threw 21 passes, scored two touchdowns on direct passes and two more as indirect results of long forward passes or long gains from lateral.

Three Big Threats To Worry Bearcats. Hayman, Hoobler and Smith will be the Coyote trio of which the Bearcats will have to be wary. Hayman, rated as one of the best ends in the conference, is usually on the receiving end of the passes which Smith, quarterback, heaves with uncanny accuracy. Hoobler, dynamic 150 pound sprinter for whom lines practically do not exist, is the big shot of the Coyote running attack. Hoobler also does the goal and conversion kicking for the Idahoans.

Albany Eleven Looms as Next Foe Of Vikings; Over-Confidence Held Responsible for Mediocre Showing

SMARTING from the blow to their pride inflicted by Hillsboro the Salem high Vikings will get work a plenty this week as they prepare for their tilt with the strong Albany high eleven here Friday night.

Both defensive and offensive tactics will be included in the strenuous drill Coach Hollis Huntington has outlined for his gridders this week. Blocking and tackling practice will be the lot of the Viking backs under Assistant Coach Tommy Drynan while Huntington will attempt to polish up the aerial attack that pulled a game out of the fire for Salem against Hillsboro.

Believing that Salem's poor showing through three quarters of the Hillsboro game was largely at matter of over confidence Huntington will attempt to develop a state of mind for the Albany clash that will make man eaters out of the red and black gridders.

Cripples Recover. With Oglesby, outstanding tackle, and Traglio, fast moving end, back in the regular lineup next week "Holly" will have a stronger forward wall against Albany than against Hillsboro.

Huntington commended the work of the Salem ends, Ellis and Curry, in the Hillsboro game and told the squad that they were the only two Vikings on the field who were playing football. Coach Ellingsen has built a strong Albany eleven around a trio of veterans. Mike Patapof, tackle, E. Sitton, hard plunging fullback, and Manning, speedy end, are the experienced men. The team is dogged on defense and though light has a flashy offensive. C. Sitton, quarterback, is the main threat in the ball packing department and has already checked in several long runs for scores this season.

Field Goal Missed. Beginning late in the opening quarter, Stanford smashed down the field 28 yards to the eight-yard mark where, early in the second period, Moscrip tried for a field goal from placement. The ball traveled wide.

Again in the same period, Thornhill's boys marched 40 yards to the 12-yard line before three losses in a row set them back 14 yards and the threat ended with an incomplete pass.

The game turned into the fourth period and Stanford put the ball into play on the Bruins' 32-yard line, due to a 38-yard punt return by Jim Coffis, substitute left half. From there Grayson carried the oval five times for a total gain of 15 yards. Moscrip was again called upon for a field goal. The placement was short.

Stanford's touchdown followed an intercepted pass by Right Half Alustiza who ran 25 yards to U. C. L. A.'s 20-yard line. Grayson went around left end for 19 yards and over on the next play.

Badgers Fail to Stop Notre Dame

Doc Spears' Boys Stage Great Battle but Go Down, 27 to 0

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Doc C. W. Spears rallied his tired and weary Wisconsin Badgers for five thrilling minutes today, but they wound up with another sick headache as one of the strongest Notre Dame football squads in years smashed and buried them under an avalanche of points, 27 to 0.

Fighting their hearts out despite injuries and a one-man rebellion staged during the week by Clarence Tommerson, spirited halfback from La Crosse, Wis., the Badgers put up a surprising battle for a time only to get their third straight licking.

Over almost every scoring avenue known to football, the fighting Irish rushed over touchdowns in the first and second periods, two more in the third, and then called it a day as Coach Elmer Layden gave all but two of the 46 players a chance to show their wares.

The Badgers shot their all in the opening drive of the game. With Tommerson the big hero of the attack, getting possession of the leather on their own 48, the Badgers passed and dashed to the Irish 15-yard stripe. But their drive sputtered and failed there, the Irish line bracing and throwing them back on their heels. Notre Dame gained possession of the ball on its 25-yard line.

Dreams Realized. TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Quick accurate aerial thrusts, coming as a surprise attack, brought realization today to a 20-year-dream of a scrappy Mississippi state football team as it defeated Alabama 20 to 7.
