Foundation for a new bloc of central European powers was seen in results of the League of Nations' vote on applying sanctions to Italy as penalty for invading Ethiopia. Refusal of Austria and Hungary to side with the 52 nations voting for sanctions aligned them definitely with Italy. Albania reserved its vote while Germany, not a member of the league, loomed as an unpredicatable factor in the shifting balance of power. Baron Pompeo Aloisi, Italian spokesman in the league, strenuously protested the vote to no avail. Britain took the first step toward applying the sanctions when it refused him radio facilities for a scheduled speech directed to United States.
