

Renovized Catholic Church to Be Reopened Formally Sunday

Improvements Are Extensive

Old Steeple is Removed; Redecoration Task in Interior Finished

Formal reopening of St. Joseph's Catholic church will be held on Sunday, October 20 after a complete interior and exterior renovation which was started three months ago. The exterior renovation consisted in removing the 75-foot steeple which was found unsafe and replacing it with a lower tower surmounted by a 16-foot gold leaf cross. The cross itself is set off by a neon light. The exterior of the entire church and rectory has been repainted and reshingled and the entrances have been rebuilt into a cathedral effect.

The interior of the church has been redecorated and stenciled. The altars, pedestals, communion railing and stations of the cross are marbled, polychromed and gilded to fit in the color scheme. A new oak floor was placed in the sanctuary.

Above the main altar, in the center background of the sanctuary a medallion of the Sacred Heart was painted in appropriate colors.

Subscriptions Raised
The renovation program was accomplished through donations raised among the parishioners during the past three months. The designing and decoration was done under the direction of Joseph Portal, a member of the parish. With the completion of this work, St. Joseph's church has not only been made beautiful but serviceable for many years to come.

The present structure is 46 years old, having been built in 1889 under the pastorate of the late Rev. Joseph White. It was dedicated by the Most Rev. Archbishop Gross on March 24, 1889, and placed under the patronage of St. Joseph. The structure is 100 feet long and 50 feet wide and has a seating capacity of 500. It was set off by a steeple that measured 150 feet from the grade to the tip of the cross, but which now has been removed. The location of which the church stands, at the time of its erection, was known as Piety Hill.

Growth Here Steady
The first Catholic church built in Salem was dedicated April 10, 1844 by the Most Rev. Norbert Blanchet. It was placed under the patronage of St. John. This structure was replaced by the present church in 1885 at which time the name was changed from St. John to St. Joseph. Previous to 1864 the Catholics of Salem were served by missionary priests, services being held in private homes. Records of the parish date back to 1862.

St. Joseph's church has enjoyed a substantial growth from its beginning and in 1925 the parish was divided and a new parish erected in North Salem under the patronage of St. Vincent de Paul. At the present time St. Joseph's parish has an enrollment of nearly 500 families. The Rev. T. J. Bernards is the present pastor, Rev. R. S. Neugebauer and J. J. Reedy are the assistants. St. Vincent de Paul parish is also administered by the local clergy.
