ing and joins it to the south. An unusual feature is the long ramp beginning just inside the entrance of the temple and sloping to the main auditorium of the church, a consideration which will permit aged and crippled persons who could not climb the main building stairs to attend the worship services.

Fireplace is Built On Each of Floors
The Sunday school temple contains 24 rooms on the three floors, basement included, and everyone save one is an outside room. A fireplace on each floor—in the university room on the main floor and high school room on the second floor and in the basement—has two kitchenettes, built-in cupboards for cloaks in the small kid-dies' classrooms, built-ins for class supplies, a roomy closet for flowers are some of the incidental features.

On the main floor are found the church office, just to the right of the west entrance, and adjoining the office the pastor's study; the university room and another large room which are separated by folding doors; and several classrooms. Throwing open the folded doors, these two rooms present a chapel which will accommodate 300 persons and which will be used for many of the church gatherings during the week.

Classrooms occupy most of the upper story, with the office of Miss Mildred Bartholomew, religious director of the church, adjoining the high school rooms. Several classrooms are also located in the basement.

Given Each Room
The temple is finished throughout with weatherwood, providing insulation and a pleasing feature is a different treatment of finish in every room. The walls are finished largely in a brush ivory weatherwood, with a darker treatment in part in some of the rooms.

Oak floors are found throughout the building. A detail of which the church is proud is the three-unit furnace, which may be operated at one or by any unit, and which for the first time in history permits the main auditorium to be both heated and ventilated. A large double fan driven by a seven horsepower motor drives the cold air through the building. All the heating registers are constructed into the wall, even in the main auditorium and in the new construction a cold air control has been cut into each floor. The temple is provided with two entrances, on the west and north, and at each are found beautiful double doors of walnut, executed by the first time in his history. The Spaulding mill and U. J. Lehman out of lumber obtained from a tree brought to Salem by Mrs. Lee and donated by Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Mosher. At each exterior wall of both entrances hang artistic lamps, harmonious with the church architecture. The temple window effects are gained through use of leaded glass.

terest, forsaking faction and bloc groups. He condemned demagogues who traded on popular fancies and distasteful. Says Depression is Past History

"The depression is over," he declared, "at least in Oregon. Business is good. Farmers are making money again. Many are buying automobiles. Theatres are crowded. There are some cases of distress but these we always have."

Governor Martin's address was received with enthusiasm by the company. President Bruce R. Baxter in a brief talk emphasized "character" as the basis of the strength of George Washington.

Relating a "chapter in Revolutionary diplomacy," C. A. Sprague sketched the services of Arthur Lee as diplomatic agent in Europe before the arrival of Franklin, in obtaining aid from France and Spain which provided arms and powder for American soldiers in the critical battle of Saratoga.

Custer E. Ross talked on the significance of Yorktown, pointing out that while it was not listed as a decisive battle from a military standpoint, it did terminate the war. He pointed out its importance in the struggle for the establishment of the American form of government.

Former Judge Tomlinson of Portland brought greetings and outlined the purposes of the S. A. R. organization.
