House Battles Upon Contest

Stage All Set, Governor Declines to Speak to Unorganized Body

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and aid him in helping to go forward with the work of the session. He announced that he would enlarge the committee on legislation and rules and the committee on public buildings, to which bills dealing with the new capitol will be referred.

"I will need the undivided support of every member of this house to make the session a success," Latourette said.

Committee on Capitol Construction Picked
The house committee which will consider the state capitol will be the old committee on public institutions; Barnes, Multnomah, chairman; Fuhrer, Marion; Hyde, Lane; Johnson, Josephine; Norton, Multnomah. One member will be named to succeed Johnson of Multnomah, resigned.

When Latourette was sworn into office by Chief Justice J. U. Campbell, Dr. J. F. Hosch of Bend who had been acting as temporary speaker during the organization turned the gavel over to him.

The house then finished the election of its regular officers. Fred Drager, veteran of many legislative sessions, was selected for chief clerk. Alton John Bassett of Portland secured the position of assistant chief clerk. Edith Low of Salem was elected calendar clerk and Herman Brown of Salem named sergeant at arms. Reading clerk went to James Vernon, with P. J. Simmons appointed door keeper and William McDermott mailing clerk.

Pre-session Caucus Also Heated Affair
In a heated four hour pre-session caucus Sunday night the house determined its organization and officers by close margins. Latourette was selected over Semon by one vote when two of Semon's supporters failed to appear. A few minutes after the vote was taken, Semon immediately moved to make the election unanimous.

A long debate was held on the right of Lew Wallace of Multnomah to vote in the session and after failing to oust him votes were given to both Farrell and Wallace who were claiming the same seat. The eligibility of the two was left to the credentials committee of the house.

After the election of Latourette a move on the part of the Semon supporters to defeat the unit rule failed after three votes were taken because too many ballots were cast in the first two. After the defeat of this motion the caucus proceeded to select the officers who were elected yesterday. Every election was decided by a close margin.

Water Company's Bill is Disputed

City Recorder A. Warren Jones didn't like to take the word of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company's meter reader for service to the city incinerator. He investigated and found, he told the city council last night, that if the incinerator faucet had been left running for 24 hours, that \$85 worth of water would not have run through it.

Company representatives explained the size of the bill as due to the fire department's connecting to the incinerator grounds faucet in fighting the Edwards & Son packing plant fire last June. The fire department used a garden hose because there was no fire hydrant in the vicinity.

The council ordered warrants amounting to \$7.89, the minimum rate for the incinerator, to be drawn.

Committee to Study Capitol

Senate Picks New Group Over Opposition of Peter Zimmerman

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the resolution by continuing the present committee and adding four members, but was ruled out of order. After the motion was adopted Zimmerman served notice he would move today to reconsider the vote on the question.

While the house was bogged down on its organization problem through most of Monday the senate swung swiftly into action by re-electing the old staff of officers, headed by Henry L. Corbett of Portland, as president. Senator Strayer, oldest in service, acted as chairman of the temporary organization and Mrs. Dorothy McCullough Lee as secretary. The only controverted question, the seating of a senator from Multnomah county in the place claimed by Ashby Dickson, democrat, and Nate Boody, republican, was referred to a credentials committee composed of Chinchock, Hazlett, Duncan, Hess and Goss. This committee will turn in a report at the session this morning.

Ingenious Defense Made by Dickson

Dickson is the elected senator, but following the 1935 session took a position as attorney for the NRA. Under the opinion of the attorney general this automatically vacated the seat, and the Multnomah county commissioners elected Nate Boody his successor. Dickson presented his own case to the committee contending that while he was attorney for NRA he was not a federal officer; and that the invalidation of NRA had the effect of rendering null any appointment to a federal position as nonexistent. He said it was not possible to return his compensation without act of congress.

Ralph E. Moody for the attorney general's office defended his opinion disqualifying Dickson. A recess was taken while more authorities were being looked up. Fisher of Douglas county was seated as successor to himself and J. G. Barrett of Umatilla county as successor to Jack Allen, resigned.

The first bill was by Hazlett of Hood River county, to exempt the RFC from having to pay the an-

nual license fee required of corporations in Oregon. It is a federal agency.

Senator Allen Bynon of Portland introduced three bills. His first would reduce the old age pension qualification from 70 to 65 years. The second would give the Portland municipal dock commission and the city of Portland the right to eminent domain outside their limits for developments in the use of Bonneville power. It would also authorize loans from the federal government secured by such property.

His third bill would permit corporations to contribute to the Portland community chest and deduct up to five per cent of their income from the state excise tax, as is the case with the federal income tax.

Wants State to Bear Entire Burden

Byron announced he would present a bill to transfer the state-county share of 50 per cent of old age pensions so that the entire 50 per cent would be borne by the state, relieving the counties of their burden.

Resolutions for the government of session fixed the compensation of clerks and assistants; forbade allowance of overtime to employees; authorized one clerk for each member, at \$5 per day, except that committee chairmen should use the committee clerk; approved appointments of clerk and stenographer for committees on judiciary and revision of laws; and clerk and assistant for engrossed and enrolled bills; limited the distribution of printed bills to five for each member.
