

Nearly 2000 Hear Aimee McPherson in First Salem Service

Equal Number Turned Away

Need of Religion is Now Great, Claim; Kidnap Story is Retold

Nearly 2000 persons crammed themselves into the high school auditorium last night to hear Aimee McPherson of Angelus temple, and judging from the periodic applause and rapt attention none was disappointed in her lively meeting. Fully as many as heard the Foursquare evangelist speak were turned away, many of them long before the 7:30 o'clock deadline drew near.

Naturally enough, Aimee dominated the gathering, though a long musical prelude, interspersed with sale of her song books and magazines, did not bring her 70-minute message to a start until 8:45 o'clock.

The blonde evangelist appeared in a floor-length dress of rich white, striking with its red-lined cape and touch of red at the cuffs of the long sleeves. Ornaments were lacking, save for a small red cloth bouquet at her left shoulder and a cross of red stones which dangled from a yoke-effect.

Evangelist Leach. In Group Singing. Sister McPherson, as she referred to herself, was introduced by Rev. Harold W. Jefferies of the Portland Foursquare church who in turn was introduced by Chris J. Kowitz, city attorney who represented Mayor V. E. Kuhn. Incidentally, Mrs. McPherson led congregational singing and made the appeal for the offering.

A dramatic moment in the song service came when Aimee sang "Foursquare Flag," written by herself, accompanying the words to waving of the red, gold, blue and royal purple banner, and touching it lightly to her lips as came the words telling the crimson in the flag to be for the blood of Jesus.

Her message, "The Measuring Rod" was based on the story of St. Peter, showing his discipleship until he stood invincible in Jesus' work, and paralleling this with conditions today, and the need for truth at the hands of Jesus.

"The fever and unrest among the nations today needs the touch of the hands of Jesus. The bringing peace, wonderful peace," she declared.

A defense of woman in the pulpit was submitted by the smiling evangelist in this wise: "It doesn't make any difference whether you wear skirts or trousers, it's the spirit of God within that counts."

Relates Story of Famous Kidnaping. Aimee devoted several minutes to explanation of the kidnaping which put her in the headlines several years ago. This, she said, resulted from threats to get Aimee when a converted dope fiend lusted, from Angelus temple, the names of persons from whom the convert had purchased dope in earlier days. Aimee said she had been lured to a car from a swim in the ocean by a child who was seriously ill and needed her prayers. She recounted her escape later from them and recalled that the writer of notes featuring in the episode later admitted the notes were a hoax.

Tonight Aimee speaks in Portland, and then will start north to speak in Vancouver, B. C., and then east across Canada. An average of four new Foursquare churches per week have been opened since Jan. 1, Rev. Jefferies declared. An orchestra and women's sextet from the Portland church furnished music last night.

Dr. H. Dunsmore of Independence Dies

Was Presbyterian Pastor There Long Periods; Later With Bank

INDEPENDENCE, Oct. 23.—Dr. Hiram Charles Dunsmore died in Salem today. He was born in Brucefield, Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1860, and came to the United States when a young man.

He was pastor of Calvary Presbyterian church from 1909 to 1913 and again from 1916 to 1923. He was united in marriage to Florence Parson at Fernville, Mich., in 1888. To this union were born two children. She passed away in 1891.

He was married to Florence A. Harvey in Chicago in 1900. She passed away in 1916. He first came to Oregon in 1911 to attend the Lewis and Clark fair as representative from Wyoming, and in 1915 represented Polk county at the San Francisco fair. He began his duties in the First National bank in 1918, where he has worked since then. In 1911 he made a trip to the Holy Land with Dr. Bell, Prof. Horn and Rev. Horn.

Funeral is Friday. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. O. A. Lacy, Los Angeles; a son, V. Fay Dunsmore, Berkeley, Calif., and three grandchildren. Also surviving are four sisters and a brother, Mrs. H. R. Howard, Perth, Ontario; Mrs. John Lawrence, Cathlamet, Ontario; Mrs. William McRay, Seaford, Ontario; Mrs. H. M. Flock, Vancouver, B. C., and R. J. Dunsmore, St. Thomas, Ontario.

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Oct. 23.—(P)—Chet Moore, 40-year-old Tillamook county farmer, lay in a hospital here tonight, suffering from a broken leg and exposure. Moore crawled 2 1/2 miles after falling over a 200-foot cliff and was within a mile and a half of his home when he was found by a searching party late today. He told his rescuers that he fell from the precipice at 11 p. m. Tuesday while deer hunting. He was within 100 yards of a county road when his cries were heard by passers-by.

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Enabling Bill Will Be Filed

Advisory Opinion Wanted From Supreme Court on Hill Location

tees the decision on which to incorporate in the committee bill. Senator Pearson inquired if there was any way to determine by court decision the correctness of the attorney general's opinion that the capitol must be located within the 1884 limits of Salem. In an attempt to clear this up a bill may be introduced by which the legislature would be empowered to ask the supreme court for advisory opinions on constitutional questions, under which the question could be propounded to the supreme court. Such a bill has been drawn. If adopted the supreme court would still have the option of refusing to render advisory opinions on moot questions.

A possibility that the legislature might appropriate a lump sum for site purposes leaving to the construction commission the final selection of the ground was mentioned by Senator Francisovich.

One General Bill Being Prepared. Instead of preparing separate bills Assistant Attorney General Ralph E. Moody is preparing one general capitol bill the preliminary form of which will contain alternate sections dealing with sites. The committee and the legislature finally would then decide which of the sections to delete from the final bill.

Moody's bill will provide for a capitol construction commission to be composed of the three members of the state board of control, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house, the chairman of the senate ways and means committee and the chairman of the house ways and means committee, all ex-officio, which would mean the personnel would change with changes in the offices.

The bill will follow the financing plan recommended by Treasurer Holman of taking the required money from the general fund in 1936, 1937 and 1938. It will also carry the emergency clause to enable the state to get immediate action and use the PWA grant, and avoid the possibility of a referendum.

There was also discussed yesterday in a conference in the governor's office the possibility of using the general fund for financing the construction program and liquor revenues for acquiring the land needed. Both methods were approved by Governor Martin in his message.

Burke Introduces Rebuilding Bill. Meantime, not waiting for action by the committee, individual members acted "on their own" in proposing capitol measures. Senator Burke introduced a bill to rebuild on the site of the burned structure and appropriating \$2,000,000 out of the general fund over a three-year term. His bill would put the job in the hands of a commission of nine members, four appointed by the president of the senate and five by the speaker of the house. Oregon materials should be used as far as possible. Burke would not use any PWA money, believing that the state can move faster and get more for its money without the grant.

In the house Representatives Olsen, Harrison and Bull introduced a resolution, as follows: "Be it Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Oregon: That the members of the committee on Public Institutions shall devote its attention to the securing of a capitol site without delay to the state of Oregon. The findings of the committee shall be reported to the house at its earliest convenience."

With specific bills before them the committees are expected to get right down to work. Senator Francisovich expressed the hope the senate could pass the bill by the first of next week.

Labor Strike at Lake Charles Less Severe

LAKE CHARLES, La., Oct. 23.—(P)—Labor strife continued to smolder on gulf coast waterfronts today, but without any outbreaks of violence such as yesterday's battle between armed docked guards and longshore strike sympathizers in which two were killed and eight wounded here. Governor O. K. Allen at Baton Rouge ordered the port closed under a three-day truce which he said would be extended, if necessary.

59th Traffic Victim Dies in Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 23.—(P)—Mrs. Cora Lynde, 76, was fatally injured when struck by a car at an intersection within 200 feet of her home here tonight. Robert Martin, 25, of Clackamas, was taken into custody and held without bail. Mrs. Lynde's death brought to 59 the number of traffic fatalities in Portland for the current fiscal year.

Pilot Killed After Plane Loses Wing

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 23.—(P)—James Shelton Cadwell, 21 years old yesterday, was killed when his plane crashed near Blue Springs today from 1,000 feet after losing a wing. He was a licensed pilot. He lived in suburban Raytown.

Jockey and Exercise Boy Held for Murder

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—(P)—Murder charges in the slaying of Mrs. Evelyn Silwinski, which climaxed a wild party here last Saturday night, were placed tonight against Willie Saunders, nationally famous jockey, and Walter Schaeffer, an exercise boy for the Headley stables. Saunders was arraigned in county court here today and released on bond of \$5,000. Schaeffer waived extradition after being taken in custody at Baltimore.

Longshoremen Refuse to Load Italian Vessel

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23.—(P)—San Francisco dock workers will refuse to handle cargo for the Italian motorship Cellina until they are officially assured nothing aboard comes under the classification of war material, Harry Bridges, longshoremen's president, announced tonight.

One of "Dutch Schultz" Aides Dies of Wounds

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 24.—(P)—Otto Berman, 46, one of the Dutch Schultz bodyguard shot by gunmen in a Newark tavern last night, died shortly before 3 a. m. today.

Kingsford-Smith Unreported Since Marseille

LONDON, Oct. 23.—(P)—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith, unreported since leaving Marseille, France, on his attempt to break the England-to-Australia record, was believed streaking tonight toward Baghdad, Iraq. Kingsford-Smith reached Marseille at 10:30 a. m. (5:30 a. m. Eastern Standard time) after a three and a half hour hop from London. He left 22 minutes later after a quick refueling.

Oxman's Veracity Attacked at Cheyenne Hearing

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 23.—(P)—To Tom Mooney's prolonged battle for absolute freedom today was added the contention of B. C. Wilson, Cheyenne railroad man, that Frank Oxman, a key state witness in the original trial, had given "testimony of doubtful veracity" in another trial.

Noted Film Stars Flirt With Death

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 23.—(P)—Falling from a log in a make-believe stream, Bill Robinson, negro film dancer, and John Boles, actor, narrowly escaped drowning at Twentieth Century-Fox studio today. Each was injured.

Robinson struck his head on the log. Stunned, he was trapped under water by branches affixed to the log to make it resemble a fallen tree. James Donlan, sound man with the camera crew, leaped into the huge tank and brought Robinson out unconscious. He was revived with an inhalator.

Boles also had a hard struggle fighting free of the branches but managed to get out unaided.

Boles' left hand was badly cut.

Withdrawal of one division of Italian troops from the African colony of Libya, it was officially indicated, was likely, and a government spokesman expressed optimism over "unconfirmed reports" that Great Britain contemplated withdrawal of four big warships from the Mediterranean.

In official quarters, where reference was made to Italy's willingness to talk about the Ethiopian dispute, it was stated that "so long as the sanction machine works at Geneva" direct negotiations between the three powers would be "difficult."

Mussolini Agrees to Withdraw Rome Men. The British parliament was filled with gloomy predictions yesterday that the war would continue for many months. Many expert observers believed that these predictions were justifiable.

However, Premier Laval of France indicated that Mussolini had agreed to withdraw a division of troops from Libya on the Egyptian border—troops whose presence have greatly irritated and disturbed the British. It was said, too, that Britain on her part would make a friendly gesture towards Italy by pulling at least a couple of warships out of the Mediterranean and thereby easing the tension in Rome.
