

Lesser Issues Handled by Senate as Major Task is Awaited

Insurance For State Studied

Senate Sustains Martin on First of Vetoes Reaching Floor

In three short sessions Wednesday the senate passed three bills, rejected majority and minority versions of state capital bills, and seven general bills. It also by unanimous vote sustained the veto of the governor on the first of the vetoed bills from last session to be brought on the floor of the senate.

It was a special measure to permit an injured workman to file a claim. The senate sustained the veto on advice the bill was unconstitutional.

One senate resolution was introduced by Senators Zimmerman and Carney and called for an investigation of the corporation commission's handling of the deficit savings and loan associations, nine in number, the representation being carried that serious irregularities in administration existed. It was referred to the ways and means committee.

Senator Wallace's bill creating Deschutes livestock district No. 1 to prevent livestock running at large, in an irrigated district was passed. Amid banter between Senators Franciscovich and Chincock the senate passed a bill to permit sale of salmon caught on Rogue river by hook and line in Josephine county as well as Curry. Another bill authorizes the superintendent of banks to require security for funds of banks in liquidation deposited in other banks.

Pension Bill
Among new bills introduced to one by Senator Hazlett which would lower the old age pension minimum to 65 years in 1940, give county relief committees power to fix the amount up to \$20 a month, and divide the cost a fourth each by county and state and a half by federal government.

Unable to agree on four proposals for handling of insurance on state buildings the senate insurance committee asked the house committee to sit with it to consider the subject. Senator Pearson's bill provides for insurance on a basis of 70 per cent of sound value.

Four proposals considered in the hearing were: that the state carry its own insurance; that the state property be protected through the present restoration fund; that the state continue its restoration fund and also carry insurance; that all state property be covered by policies in recognized companies.

The senate committee on agriculture voted to report out favorably a bill by Burke and Stringer repealing a section of the state milk control law which exempts grade A, producer-distributors from the pooling provisions.

Senator Burke declared that in event this exemption was not repealed the entire milk control act might be declared invalid. The milk control law is now under attack in Multnomah county. Burke said the exemption was unfair. The bill is expected to precipitate a fight.

Salvation Army's Fund Drive Looms
Demands upon the Salvation Army will be increased this winter, Captain Lewis McAllan predicted yesterday in announcing that a campaign would start Monday to raise a \$2500 budget for the coming year's activities. The budget amount and campaign date were set by the Salvation Army executive committee headed by William McGilchrist, Jr. The campaign will run for one week, it is planned.

Captain McAllan said withdrawal of federal aid to transient men was bringing more calls for aid to his relief organization in addition to local pleas for help. The Army here hopes in the near future to trade its vacant lot on State street for a suitable building where needy persons may be fed and housed.

Slot Machine Smashup Delayed by New Order; To Keep For Evidence
In connection with the order issued this week for destruction of seven slot machines involved in slot machine possession charges against George Clark and Eugene Eckert, Judge McMahon has issued another order staying the destruction because Ralph Moody, special prosecutor of gambling investigation before the present grand jury, has requested their retention as evidence for the grand jury proceedings.

Floods Cause 115 Known Deaths in Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, Oct. 30.—(P)—Floods sweeping Honduras had taken a known death toll of 115 lives tonight and unofficial estimates of the damage reached more than \$12,000,000. Hundreds of Americans live in the flooded area, but none was known to have drowned.

Center of Storm Whistles Into Manitoba

SEATTLE, Oct. 30.—(P)—The center of a winter storm, gripping western North America, whistled eastward into Manitoba tonight, carrying a cold drizzle that froze as it fell. Temperatures tumbled and sleet dragged down telephone and telegraph lines.

Bordeaux Building in Olympia Burns

OLYMPIA, Wash., Oct. 30.—(P)—Fire tonight destroyed the Leo Bordeaux building in the heart of Olympia's business section. The building contained a garage and gas station.

Judge Olson Criticizes Martin for Paroles

PORTLAND, Oct. 30.—(P)—Circuit Judge Fred W. Olson leveled criticism at Governor Charles Martin tonight following the latter's pardon of three men sentenced earlier today to jail terms for traffic violations. "I can't understand why men in high positions would want to meddle with such things," Judge Olson declared in commenting that "the purpose of the court is thus defeated."

Livestock Theft Charge is Faced
Gordon Burnett Bowman, 40, of Independence route one, is due to appear in circuit court at Dallas for sentence Friday on a charge of stealing livestock, state police here announced last night. He pleaded guilty to the charge Tuesday after having waived preliminary hearing in justice court and grand jury appearance.

State troopers said Bowman admitted the theft of 26 sheep from an unidentified owner. He was said to have sold the animals to a farmer living near Albany. He is being held in Polk county in lieu of \$1500 bail.

Sheep thieves recently have stolen approximately 150 head in the district south of Independence, according to the state officers.

The crew of 24 enumerators for the federal health survey to be conducted here within the next few months will be drawn from Salem relief rolls insofar as possible, WPA placement officials said yesterday. WPA regulations permit employing workers outside the relief rolls to a limited extent in case not enough of the desired class in point of skill can be secured from the relief department.

WPA wages for professional technical workers are \$77 a month, for skilled office workers \$70. The survey crew will consist of both classifications, according to A. B. Clark, state representative of the United States public health service, sponsor of the project in cooperation with the Marion county health department.
