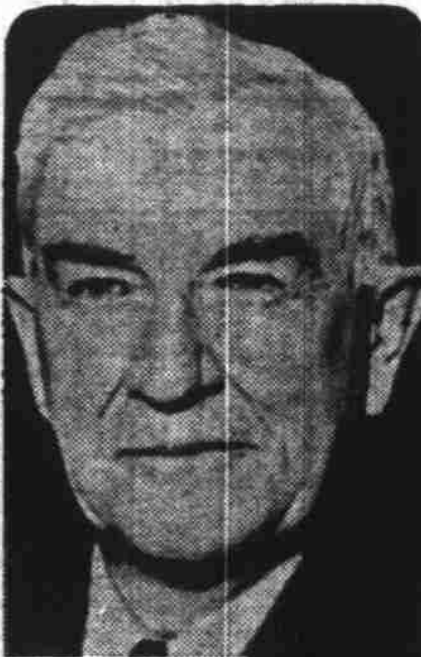

As the political fanfare grows noisier with the approaching presidential convention, six persons who comprise the Republican national committee executive board are working quietly on the strategy which they hope will elect a Republican president next year. These six veterans of the political arena include Henry P. Fletcher, chairman, scion of a wealthy Pennsylvania family; Ralph E. Wil-

liams, vice chairman, Oregon bank executive; J. Henry Koraback, vice chairman, New England industrial and utility head and dominant force in Connecticut politics; Mrs. Alvin T. Hert, vice chairman, Kentucky business woman and aristocrat; George de B. Keim, New Jersey manufacturer and banker, and George F. Getz, Illinois coal magnate and sportsman.

Steeves vs. Hunt Case Argued Here

Trustee Bank Demurs and Claims Trust Intend May be Retained

The suit brought against Elaine W. Hunt by Sarah H. Steeves as executrix of the E. L. Steeves estate, for dissolution of a trust set up for Miss Hunt, came up before Judge Lewelling yesterday on demurrer on behalf of the First National Bank of Portland, trustee for the trust.

Following the argument, in which a number of legal interpretations were advanced, Judge Lewelling took the matter under advisement.

C. E. Zollinger appeared for the First National Bank of Portland and, stating that the main argument against the trust is that it offends against the rule of perpetuities, held that even if the trust does violate that rule, the main intention of the trust could be carried out and the plan of the testator followed.

Claim Trust Fails
 The trust falls through the offense against the rule of perpetuities, Alan Carson and Dwight Lear, appearing for the Steeves, contended.

The trust fund now reaches about \$135,000, and under it Elaine W. Hunt, grandniece of the late Dr. Steeves, is to receive \$100 per month until her marriage or death to permit her freedom to continue labors in public welfare.

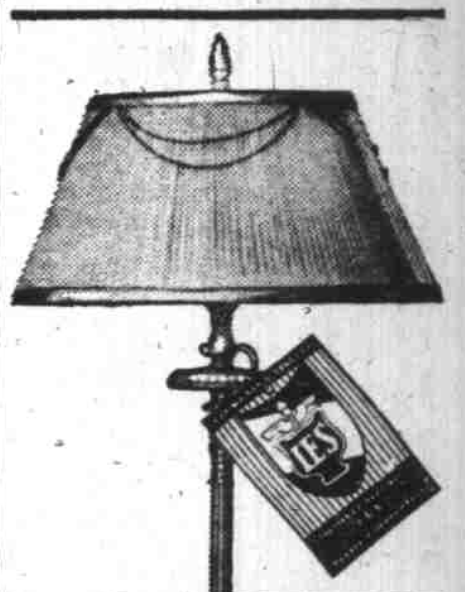

No Sign of Fraud High Court Rules

The state supreme court Tuesday affirmed Judge Hall S. Lusk of the Multnomah county circuit court in a suit brought by Mrs. Carrie Rouse to recover damages of \$5,000 from the Estabable Loan association. The lower court held for the defendant corporation.

Mrs. Rouse alleged conspiracy on the part of the loan association to cheat and defraud her out of certain real property. The plaintiff contended that as a result of the conspiracy and fraud a mortgage foreclosure suit was wrongfully instituted and her property sold to satisfy an indebtedness not due.

Justice Belt held that there was no evidence of conspiracy, fraud or damage.
