Mt. Angel Ballots Down Gymnasium For Grammar School Now That New Structure for College is Planned

MT. ANGEL, Nov. 12.—A special meeting was called Saturday night in the St. Mary's school to bring the building of a gymnasium for the children of the grammar school to a public vote. It was explained to the people that cost of the gymnasium would mean the raising of approximately \$7,000 by the community, necessitating the levying of a special tax. About \$5000 more would be contributed by government funds through the PWA. The measure lost 35 to 2. Many

reasoned that now that Mt. Angel college is planning to build a new gym, which will be used for all intercollegiate games and athletic meets, it would no longer be necessary to provide a special gymnasium for the grade pupils, as the school auditorium was deemed suitable for the demands made on it by the limited athletic activities of the graders.

The voters, however, voted 28 for and 2 against the building of a playshed for the children. It was thought that an open air playing place for the children in bad weather was a real necessity, as the basement playrooms now used are deemed unhealthy. The cost of the playshed was set at about \$2000 and will have to be contributed entirely by the town as playsheds do not qualify for government loans. Building will not begin until spring.

Hannah Elder is Called to Beyond

Scarlet Fever Cause of Death; Funeral is Not Complete

STAYTON, Nov. 12.—Mrs. Hannah Elder, 78, died at her home here Sunday, after a brief illness with scarlet fever. She was born in Georgia July 31, 1857, a daughter of McMillin and Elizabeth Mann, who were natives of Tennessee. A great uncle of Mrs. Elder was the fifth governor of Tennessee.

She was married to William Wallace Elder in Kansas in 1876. After residing there for a time they moved to Oregon with their three children and located in Stayton in 1881. Elder entered the mercantile business with Uriah Whitney, selling out in 1892 and entering the insurance business to which he devoted his time until 1903 when he was appointed commandant at the Soldiers Home at Roseburg. Here he lived with his wife and daughter Grace, until 1915, when they again returned to Stayton to make their home.

Hennies is Foreman on Job to Widen, Ditch and Gravel Route

OLVERDALE, Nov. 12.—Wednesday morning a new WPA project started under the foremanship of L. E. Hennies. It is called the Van Nuy project and is being worked out 1.6 miles of a road northeast of Turner. The road will be widened and ditches dug for better drainage. It will also be gravelled.

This project will furnish 52 "man months" employment or four and one-third months for the 12 men employed; \$2300 in round figures have been allotted. When this project is completed Hennies will start another one near Pariah Gap.
