Turner Bridge Planned—An agreement was drawn up yesterday between Marion county and the city of Turner by which the county will construct a bridge on fifth street in Turner to cost around \$1100, which amount will be repaid by the city at the rate of \$200 each year. This fifth street bridge, a permanent structure, will be constructed by the county as a detour bridge while it is building a new bridge on the market road going through Turner, and later will become the property of the city, according to present plans.

Treasurer Given Unusual Powers

Bill Authorizing Transfer of Funds Expected to Result in Saving

Unusual authority is extended to the state treasurer under senate bill 49, approved at the recent legislative session, D. O. Hood, state budget director, declared Tuesday.

The measure was introduced by Senator Bynon and authorized the transfer and retransfer of money and credit between and among the various funds in the state treasury department.

"This bill, in reality, will set up a realistic state-owned bank," Hood declared. Hood said a study of the bill indicated that the state treasurer would have authority to accept state deposits, loan state money at interest to other state activities, and make adjustments between state funds.

The bill is now before Governor Martin but has not been signed. Hood said that while there were some objections to the bill it probably would save the state a large amount in interest. The state treasurer is authorized to draw on an adequate fund in his department when another fund is inadequate.

Sewing Project Starts Tuesday

The much-discussed Salem WPA sewing project will start next Tuesday in the old relief headquarters sewing room on the balcony of the Chambers building, it was announced at the WPA offices yesterday upon completion of financing arrangements. The cost of heating, rent, lighting and sewing machine rental is being taken care of by the county relief committee.

The WPA requested the national reemployment agency to assign 104 women from the relief rolls to the sewing room. They will be divided into two five-day week six-hour shifts of 7 a. m. to 1:30 p. m. and 1:30 p. m. to 8 p. m. Wages will be \$48 to \$77 a month. One woman supervisor for each shift will be hired by the WPA outside the relief rolls. Applicants were advised to apply at WPA headquarters, second floor, Chambers building, at once.

Girl Magician to Be Brought Here

It is Vantine, the magician, and Millicent Cazan, known as the girl Houdini, and a protégé of Mrs. Beatrice Houdini. She offers a reward of \$10 to anyone bringing her a modern handkerchief from which she cannot escape. This young girl is a graduate of a Spokane high school and has worked as a double in the movies. She is a physical culture expert and excels in sports, particularly swimming.

Lack of Museums Handicap to Art

Impressions After Europe Trip are Outlined by Miss Ruth Brauti

America, and particularly the west coast, is seriously handicapped for art development in that it has no art museums in which to preserve the work of its artists, as compared with the large number of particularly fine and comprehensive museums of Europe, Miss Ruth Brauti, art instructor at Salem high school, declared Tuesday night in her talk before the Salem Arts league in the auditorium of the Salem public library.

Miss Brauti, who spent two years in Europe studying art, gave a fascinating talk on her experiences in France, Germany and Italy, to a large and interested group. Her talk climaxed the Salem observance of National Art week, and was also the November program of the Arts league.

She discovered that Americans going abroad are noticeable for their lack of a true appreciation of art. The serious students are lost in the general crowd of serious European students. She deplored the lack of art museums in America because she found it was necessary to have a comprehensive background of the past on which to build the future. To make good modern art, she said, it was necessary to keep one hand on the past and the other reaching out into the future.

It was good home to her in her studies on the continent and in her association with art instructors that all knowledge concerning art is not to be got from books but by actual contact with the living art of the past and trends. Individualism seemed to reign supreme. Each art school had its technique and was jealous of other art schools. Opinion was in turmoil all the time. There was a mix of old and new. The student could take or leave.

Politics Handicap
She was questioned concerning the political situation and admitted that in both Italy and Germany it did affect the artist's work but mostly in Germany where Hitler decided what was art. She concluded with a brief description of her trip through the orient.

In connection with the observance of National Art week as sponsored by the American Artists Professional league, three Salem artists, members of the Salem Arts league, won ribbons at the exhibit in Portland, Miss Constance Fowler, art director for the Salem Arts league, won two first places. One blue ribbon was given for a study in oil and the other for a study in watercolor.

Mrs. D. L. Shrode received one blue ribbon on a flower exhibit and a second place on a landscape. Mrs. S. B. Lehtinen won a second award on a waterfront study. These are all members of the painting section of the Arts league and had work on exhibit at the exhibition of artists held in the fireplace room of the Salem public library.

Bible Anniversary Will Be Observed

Salem churches have designated Sunday, November 17, for observance of the 400th anniversary of the printing of the first English bible, and churches throughout the city will hold special services that Sunday in recognition of the event.

A number of churches will arrange displays of old bibles. This event is being sponsored as a city-wide observance by the Salem Ministerial association, of which Rev. James E. Milligan of the First M. E. church is president. Capt. Lewis McAllan of the Salvation Army, and Dr. E. S. Hammond are the committee for this occasion.

The first bible printed entirely in English came from the press of Miles Coverdale in October, 1535.

Kurtz Will Direct Survey of Illness

Dr. Howard Kurtz, former Willamette student, will direct the United States public health service survey of disabling illnesses and chronic disease here, it was announced by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer yesterday. Dr. Kurtz is now in Portland receiving instructions for the survey, which is similar to one to be conducted in Portland.

Applications are now being received at the health office, 201 Masonic building, of persons desiring appointment to the survey crew, which will be paid out of federal funds. Persons on the relief rolls will be given preference where they can qualify. A crew of 25 workers will be engaged for five months or more in visiting each home in Salem to secure the desired information.

The survey may get under way late next week.

Timber Firm Not Entitled to Pay

The state of Oregon is not obligated to pay the Weyerhaeuser Timber company for trees felled in connection with construction of a highway from the navigable waters of Coos Bay to Roseburg, Attorney General Van Winkle held Tuesday.

The right of way was granted by the United States to the state of Oregon to aid in the construction of a military highway. The Weyerhaeuser Timber company alleged the right of way had reverted to the owner for the reason that the state has abandoned or discontinued use of the road.

The state forestry department claims the road has not been abandoned and has been open during the greater part of the year.

The opinion was requested by Lynn Cronmiller, state forester.

Definite Figures Upon Total Tax Levy are Due Soon; Forecasts Made

Definite figures on the tax levy for 1936 are not yet available. The state levy, it has been indicated, will be approximately the same as that of 1935. The school and county levy is said to be more than this year though an estimate of the increase could not be given.

The state levy will be announced around December 1. The county levy will have to be adjusted after the final budget hearing December 2.

Foreclosure Bill To Benefit Salem

Grouping of Complaints to Mean Saving When New Law is Effective

Salem city officials are going to take advantage of one bill that was passed by the special session of the legislature when it becomes law. Senate bill 51 which provides for the simplification of foreclosure proceedings on delinquent liens and assessments will be beneficial to Salem, it is said.

The recent audit of city affairs showed an outstanding amount of \$532,398.40 in bonded or rebonded liens. Of this amount \$137,790.96 were delinquent. There is also a delinquency of \$55,295.49 in unbonded liens.

Under the law as it was before the special session the city was required to file a complaint to foreclose each individual lien. The law as amended will permit the cities to group the delinquent assessments in one or more complaints.

Saving to Result
This procedure will result in a saving of time to officials and will also result in a saving of costs in publishing notices and complaints for non-resident property owners.

City officials have been contemplating starting action on the delinquent accounts and were considering employing special attorneys because of the amount of work involved. This will not be necessary with the new law in effect it is said.

"We are going to start immediately on the foreclosure of these delinquencies," City Attorney Kowitz said.

"There is no reason why we shouldn't go ahead now that it will not be necessary to use special counsel," Mayor V. E. Kuhn declared.

There are 3095 delinquent bonded liens which will be subject to foreclosure under the plan of city officials to take the property off the tax rolls and to protect the city's equity.
