Symphony Season In Portland To Begin

SUNDAY afternoon before a brilliant audience in Washington, D. C., Portland's world-known conductor, Willem van Hoogstraten, guest, conducted the National Symphony orchestra. On Tuesday evening he leads the same orchestra in a performance given in Baltimore, thus preceding his return here for his eleventh consecutive season with the Portland Symphony orchestra. Immediately after, writes Mr. van Hoogstraten, he will board a train for Portland to prepare for the opening concert of the Silver Jubilee season here November 18.

Conductor van Hoogstraten has already made his selections for the opening program. Heralding a season of great symphonic music supplemented by world-famous assisting soloists, the first program is an index to what both Portland's veteran conductor and the symphony office promise to be a season worthy of the orchestra's 25 years of experience and prestige.

The opening program: Academic Overture—Brahms Concerto Grosso No. 12 in G Major—Handel Johnnie Comes Marching Home—Roy Harris Intermission—Beethoven Fifth Symphony

The two numbers never before played in Portland are expected to intrigue "first nighters." After securing European music centers Mr. van Hoogstraten was able to buy Handel's Concerto Grosso No. 12 in G Major for strings, and he will give it its premiere performance here on the opening program. It is expected this composition will add particular zest to the importance of this occasion.

Roy Harris, at home in Princeton, N. J., has been acclaimed as one of the greatest living modern composers. His suite, "Johnnie Comes Marching Home," has been played in Europe as well as in America and hailed as an outstanding exponent of modern music. Mr. van Hoogstraten will introduce it to a Portland audience for the first time.

Following the intermission, Beethoven's great Fifth Symphony balances the new with the old and the opening program of the Silver Jubilee concert will have passed into musical history of a quarter century's making.

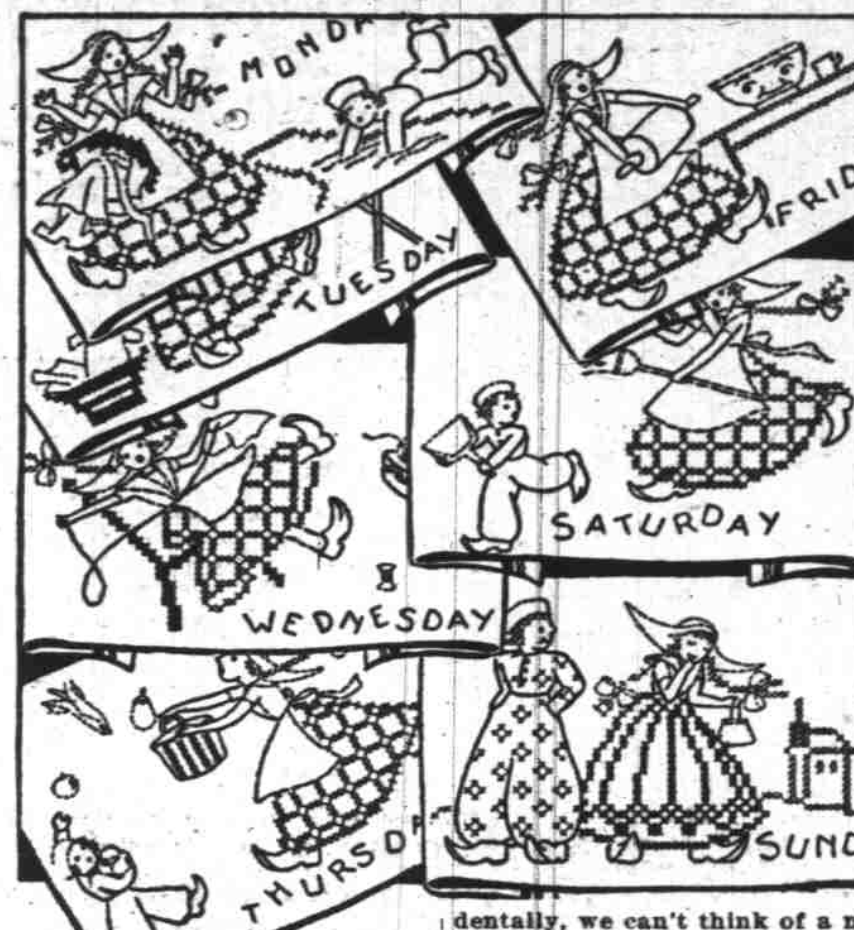
