Distribution System to Cost \$735,000 Is Now Proposed by Board

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would cost approximately \$300,000. Rostein told the committee. A Willamette river supply, with proper filtration plant, he estimated to cost \$450,000.

The people would have to vote on a million dollar bond issue to finance a Willamette river supply, declared Commissioner E. B. Gabriel.

"You'll never get to the San Juan within your two and one-half millions of bonds," he averred.

The outcome of present well tests will be known within 30 to 60 days, the commissioners announced. Present indications in the test holes were termed "favorable."

More Modest Plan Shown at Present

The commission considered, then shored aside, a supplementary report made by Engineer R. E. Koon, at its request, outlining a less expensive distribution program. Koon's written report estimated cost of the small program at \$339,683 in addition to \$250,000 for new reservoir and water tower. It would provide all necessary new mains ten inches or larger in diameter and 133 new fire hydrants.

"If we are going to improve this system, let's get to work and improve it, carry out the full program," Commissioner J. M. Rickman urged.

The commission told the mayor and his committee that WPA labor might be used to save \$50,000 in payroll costs and that replacements and extensions of four-inch mains probably could be paid for out of water department earnings.

Discussion of the amount that should be asked of the council led to a motion by Commissioner L. M. Doughton that \$735,000 for the full improvement program originally outlined by the engineers be requested.

Job Insurance Bill Doubtful

Measures Under Cloud as to Validity Are Filed Without Signature

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January 1, 1938 and each year thereafter. The tax is to be levied in lieu of nine-tenths of the federal tax on payrolls and the funds will be retained for unemployment benefits for Oregon industries.

Pension Measure Also Questioned

The old-age pension bill, reducing the age limit to 65 years, also became law although its constitutionality has been questioned on the ground that it covers two different subjects, contrary to the Oregon constitution. The measure eliminates counties from participating in matched federal funds.

The sales tax bill, to be voted upon January 31, 1936, did not require the governor's signature to go on the ballot. Governor Martin accompanied the bill with a statement:

"I take this opportunity to reaffirm my cordial and wholehearted approval of old age pensions, unemployment insurance and other forms of assistance."

The governor disapproved senate bill No. 9, by Murke, providing for the repeal of the 1933 legislative act fixing a compulsory student fee of \$15 a year, for all persons attending Oregon's higher educational institutions.

The veto was based on an opinion by Attorney General VanWinkle in which he held that a referendum already had been filed against the 1935 compulsory student fee law. He said that because of this, the repeal bill was unconstitutional.

"The special legislative bill attempted to withdraw from consideration of the voters a matter that is now legally before them," VanWinkle said.

All bills included in the social security program either were signed by the governor or filed with the state department to become laws without his signature.

Borah Indicates He Is Receptive

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(P)—Senator Borah of Idaho thrust himself further into the political picture of 1936 today, announcing he had "a definite objective in mind," but parrying all direct questions as to whether he sought the republican presidential nomination.

In an extraordinary press conference, however, the Idahoan caught the ear of trained political observers with an assertion that friends of Herbert Hoover were organizing in his behalf.

"I do not know what is in his own mind," said Borah of Hoover, in answer to a question, "but I do know his friends are working for his nomination."

Jackson Farmers Slow

Signing Up For Wheat

Inconsistencies of Bill Also Under Fire; to Need Court Ruling

erected on the old site exclusively.

"Section four provides that the commission shall have the power and it shall be its duty to accept any grant or donation of land or any gift of money or other valuable thing made to the state for any of the purposes contemplated by the act."

"Section ten provides that the commission shall have the power to obtain the title to any land by this act authorized to be acquired by donation, purchase, agreement, condemnation, or through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, in the manner prescribed."

"There then follows more than four pages specifying in detail the exact methods to be used by the commission in acquiring the additional land forbidden by section six by implication to be acquired."

"If section six is to be regarded as the final declaration of legislative intention, what reason is there for section 10?"

"I note that the title of the bill states in part, that this is an act providing for the location of the capitol building or buildings and for the acquisition of land therefor, providing for the acceptance of donations and gifts of land, and providing for the exercise of the power of eminent domain."

Won't Buy Canadian

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15.—(P)—Harry A. Green, president of the Doernbecher Furniture Manufacturing company, told a furniture workers' union today that he had issued instructions to his purchasing department not to buy Canadian lumber if the import tariff is reduced.

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
