

Croats on Hunger Strike After Their Lawyer is Disbarred

Plot Charges Deemed Cause

American - Hired Attorney Wants to Air Part of Nations in Crime

AIX-EN-PROVENCE, France, Nov. 19.—(P)—Three Croat terrorists, on trial for complicity in the assassination of King Alexander of Yugoslavia, began a hunger strike tonight in protest against the disbarring of their lawyer.

As Georges Desbons, hired by Croats of the United States to defend the three men, was dragged from the courtroom by police, he shouted: "I was disbarred by French justice in order to prevent damaging revelations of responsibility of certain foreign nations in the assassination."

Desbons, in a statement, declared: "Six months ago a Balkan diplomat offered me 400,000 francs to insert three questions at the trial which he said would 'start the next war in Europe.'"

He asserted Serbians jealous of King Alexander plotted his assassination at Paris in July, 1934. He said he had filed proofs of the plot in the Paris court of appeals, "knowing I would be disbarred here."

The trial, which opened yesterday, was suspended until tomorrow when the defendants—Mio Kralj, Ivan Rajlich and Zvonimir Pospeschil—refused to accept the service of Jacques Saudino, whom the court selected as their counsel to succeed Desbons.

Three others to accompany Baer to Seattle for deportation include David Wagner, being returned to England for being twice convicted, and Jean Paul La Rue and Louis Frohisher, Canadians, asserted in this country illegal.

Immigration Officer Norton said today Mrs. Baer had not responded to the government's offer to pay transportation for her and the Baers' three children to Germany.

West Salem Hall Plan Now Revised

Revised plans on the West Salem municipal building were approved by the city council there last night and the announcement made that copies of specifications would be available to contractors from Recorder Maude Miller Friday.

The plans were altered in numerous minor constructional ways, such as replacing masonry with fir doors and concrete with wood floors, in an effort to put the cost of the project down to the \$24,792 available with PWA grant. New bids probably will be opened early in December.

Only one qualified bid was received on the project last Saturday and it amounted to \$35,417.

U. S. and British Diplomats Eye Orient Flareup

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(P)—The supposedly imminent seizure by Japan of control over North China, a matter of growing administration concern, today precipitated a joint Anglo-American canvass of the crisis. For half an hour, Sir Ronald Lindsay, the tall British ambassador to Washington, discussed the Sino-Japanese developments with the undersecretary of state, William Phillips. If any possibility of joint action by the two governments was discussed, however, it was kept a carefully guarded secret.

Republicans, Not Lumbermen Complain, Held

SEATTLE, Nov. 19.—(P)—Rep. Monrad C. Wallgren (D-Wash.) in a radio address tonight, defended terms of the Canadian-United States trade treaty and asserted most complaints on lumber tariff reductions have "come not from lumbermen, but from republicans." He said the 250,000,000 board feet on which the tax and tariff has been reduced by 50 per cent is but a small part of the annual production of Washington and Oregon which in 1922 was 3,864,581,000 board feet.

Macaroni Manufacturer Slain in Factory Office

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—(P)—Samuel Incandella, 31, was shot and killed today by an unidentified gunman in the office of the macaroni factory he owned, becoming another victim of slayings executed in hoodlum fashion here in six days. Police said they would investigate a possibility Incandella was killed in reprisal for resisting efforts of gangsters to share his business.

Noted Test Pilot Leslie Tower Dies of Injuries

DAYTON, O., Nov. 19.—(P)—Leslie Tower, one of the country's best known airplane test pilots, tonight became the second victim of the crash and burning October 30, of the army's "flying fortress," Tower, 32, and a veteran of army and civilian flying, died in a hospital at 6:07 p. m., from the effects of burns received in the accident which cost the life of Maj. Ployer P. Hill, chief of the army's flying section here. Three other men were injured.

William Gibbs, Long Creek Pioneer, Wounded

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 19.—(P)—The sheriff's office at Canyon City today reported it had received word that William Gibbs, 65, was shot accidentally on a hunting trip on Hunkins creek today. Details were not known. Gibbs has been a resident of Long Creek for 33 years.

Premier Mussolini, engaged in a grim battle at home against sanctions, declared a monopoly on all Italian gold. The future requisition of private gold holdings was seen as possible.

The fascist grand council endorsed his African program and stood firm on the ground of no compromise.

Italians will not be allowed to sell gold without first offering it to the government and 5 per cent interest on gold turned over was offered.

A communique issued in Rome said the sultanate of Biru, in northeastern Ethiopia, had submitted to the Italians.

The Swedish committee decided in Stockholm to award no Nobel peace prize this year.

Storage Building For City Planned

A 100 by 141 foot concrete city shops and storage building will be built on the present city barn site at 13th and Ferry street as a WPA project if necessary funds to defray cost of materials can be raised by the city council, plans being drawn jointly by the staffs of the city engineer and the building inspector show. The structure, 27 feet high, would extend 14 feet south from Ferry street along the east side of 13th.

Provision is made in the plans for storage of city power shovels, a dozen automobiles, several trucks, large quantities of cement, and of miscellaneous tools and small supplies. In addition there would be a machine shop, dog pound room, office and mezzanine floor apartment for a caretaker.

The present city barns, old wooden structures harking back to livestock days, are in a seriously dilapidated condition, their beams sagging and roofs leaking badly.

"No Starvation" Policy Declared

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(P)—President Roosevelt placed a "no starvation" federal relief policy before American mayors today.

He proposed a winter conference looking toward "a better system of taxation, state, municipal and federal."

Nearly half a hundred members of the United States conference of mayors gathered in the chief executive's office applauded when Mr. Roosevelt repeated a question asked at his earlier press conference, "Is the government going to stop direct relief next July?" and retold his reply:

"My answer was that the federal government, and I am sure your answer will be the same for the city governments, does not propose to let people starve after the first of July any more than during the past few years."

Books of Capitol Group Face Audit

Books of the State Capitol committee of Salem citizens who were working on the location for the new capitol building will be audited by a committee from the chamber of commerce, it has been announced.

Walter Molloy, president of the chamber, has appointed W. M. Hamilton, Tom Windishar and Willis Clark to make the audit.

The audit was requested by the members of the capitol committee. After the books, showing receipts and expenditures, have been audited by the special committee they will be available for inspection by any contributor to the committee funds at the chamber of commerce office, it was said.

The State Capitol committee sought to have the new capitol building placed upon more adequate grounds. It was organized soon after the old building burned last April.

Student Body Leader Case Ended; Principal Declines Any Comment

Principal Fred D. Wolf declared at Salem high school yesterday that his action in discharging Marion Draper from the student body presidency was final and he did not care to say anything further about the affair. Student petitions presented yesterday asking for an explanation at a special assembly Monday will be disregarded, he said, adding that many parents had telephoned him requesting that names of their children be scratched off the petitions.

The complaint of some students was chiefly that Draper's case had not been handled through the student council as provided in the student body constitution.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(P)—Amid republican denunciation of the Canadian tariff-reduction treaty, President Roosevelt tonight announced a survey to check its effect upon commerce with the dominion.

At the same time, state department officials lauded the trade pact as a step toward the elimination of world trade deterrents, without which, Secretary Hull said, there can be no permanent world economic recovery.

At republican western headquarters in the same city, Harrison Spangler, targeted the agreement as a "step toward free trade" and called for a referendum before it is made effective. Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) was satirically critical.
