



December 17 was set by the civil service commission yesterfor promotions of city policemen. Applications to take the examinations must be filed with A. Warren Jones, chief examiner, by December 12.

Only present policemen who have seen at least three years' service are eligible to take the tests, which if passed will place for display and sale. them in line for promotion in event of a vacancy in the officered positions. There are four such positions on the Salem police department - chief, day sergeant, night sergeant, sergeant inspec-

The examinations will cover city ordinances, laws of arrest, geography of the city, spelling, arithmetic, and practical questions.

Patrolman Donald Nicholson was high man among those taking the promotion exams when the police went under civil service. These tests are supposed to be given every two years.






