Hurts Toe When Iron Slips From Its Board

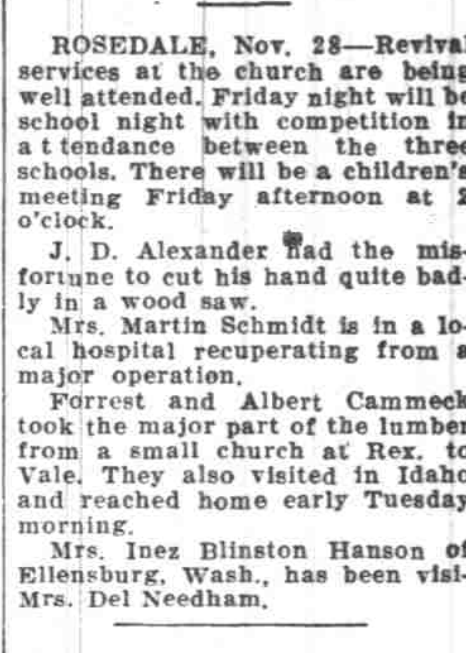
