Hawley Sees Objections By Party Leaders to Landon and Knox

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people who voted for Mr. Hoover in 1932 would vote for him again. It would not be an impossible job to deflect enough votes from Roosevelt to merge with a staunch bloc for Mr. Hoover and to secure a republican victory next year."

Mr. Hawley said the nation was growing alarmed over the "reckless" spending of the Roosevelt administration and the creation of a staggering national debt. "Yet the president is hard put to retrench," he pointed out. "The moment he cuts people from federal relief their ingratitude reveals itself and they turn against him. Much of the federal program of public works has resulted in waste of money on non-essential projects. This does not apply to all the federal works—some have been valuable. But in numerous instances the federal government has encouraged cities and states to incur debts for work relief on projects which had little or no merit."

Mr. Hawley's view is that a dark horse will win the republican nomination in 1936—a man now comparatively unknown, a man without damaging previous connections, a man who can define the issues of economy and a budget-balance in 1936 without carrying with him the animus of previously unsound political alliances.

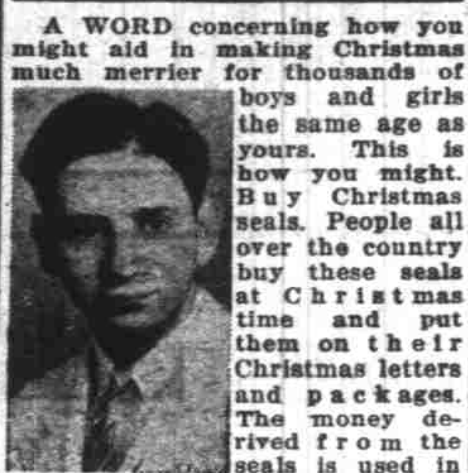
His own views about a race for congress in 1936: The broad Hawley smile and the same answer that has been given the last year. Perhaps a race in 1936. Who knows?

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probably been in the water about three to five weeks, Dr. Barrick said. The dead man was somewhere between 55 and 70 years of age, indicated by grey hair, but there were no objects about his body that would serve to identify him. He carried an old-fashioned stem-winder watch, the key with which the watch was wound, and a jack-knife.

His pockets were filled with good-sized rocks, about 20 pounds in all, and a small, old-fashioned stuffed into his socks, indicating the probability of suicide, the coroner said. The man, about 5 feet 11 inches, weighing about 175 pounds, apparently was a transient, as no one in that district was reported missing. Kaseg as in the neck at first indicated the possibility his throat had been slashed in foul play, but when similar marks were found elsewhere on his body, it was believed that small parts of his flesh had been eaten away by natural causes.

The body was turned over to Miller's mortuary in Aurora, where it was expected that interment would take place.

Knowles Ends His Water Task Here

Frank C. Knowles, geologist employed by the Salem water commission, has returned to California, Wash., his home, and is not expected to return unless the commission calls for him. Before he left last Wednesday afternoon he submitted to Water Manager Cuyler Van Patten a detailed report of his studies of data obtained from test well drillings made by the N. C. Janssen Drilling company. The report, Van Patten said yesterday, will not be released for publication until it has been read by the water commissioners.

The commission, whose regular semi-monthly meeting comes next Friday, is not expected to consider Knowles' report before the city council convenes Monday night. The council at that time is expected to act on the commission's funds with which to improve the city's water distribution system.

Mrs. Miller of Aurora Seriously Injured in Smashup near Newberg

Mrs. S. A. Miller, Aurora, was seriously injured in an automobile accident at Newberg yesterday when the car driven by her husband went out of control as a wheel left the highway.

Fiedler Is Given Jolt of 15 Years

Limit for Manslaughter; Mrs. Spadafore Freed By Portland Judge

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A slight, blond youth of 23 saw prison gates close behind him today, not to be opened to him for 15 years. A work-worn woman of 35 went back home to her family of five small children, free. Each was convicted of manslaughter in Portland circuit court.

George Leonard Fiedler shot and killed a sheriff's deputy who sought to arrest him for a hunting violation. Mrs. Agnes Spadafore struck and killed her husband, Carl, 44, with a stove iron. He was drunk, she said, and had attacked her brutally.

"To send this woman to the penitentiary would result in her children suffering," said Judge John W. Winter in paroling her from a sentence of 18 months and a fine of one dollar.

Young Fiedler, charged with first degree murder, was convicted of manslaughter. Judge Hall S. Lusk gave him the maximum penalty for manslaughter—15 years and a fine of \$5000.

George L. Fiedler, 22, who is under 15 years sentence for the slaying of Deputy Sheriff Ernest Loll of Multnomah county, was "dressed in" at the Oregon state penitentiary here today. He was assigned to a "fish cell." Fiedler later will be assigned to unloading hog fuel for use of the institution.

Japan's Military Party Is Blamed

NANKING, Nov. 29.—(AP)—China's central government openly indicted the Japanese army today for "convinced" to create an autonomous state in North China.

A sharply worded protest, following an earlier communication of the Japanese embassy which assailed seizure of the railway junction point of Fengtai, east of Peking, by Japanese troops, was filed with Japan by the foreign office.

It declared "disgruntled elements, acting in connivance with Japanese military officers," had brought about the autonomy movement, which the note stated, was contrary to popular desires.

The successive protests, informed persons stated, plainly indicated the Japanese government was stiffening its opposition to the campaign of secession—apparently as a result of new manifestations of Chinese popular feeling against autonomy.

Survey of Credit Business Is Given

Credit issued by local firms who are members of the credit association runs the gamut of a low of 30 per cent to a high of 75 per cent of the annual business, according to incomplete figures on a survey which the Salem credit association is making among its members. A. A. Hall of the credit bureau reported.

Total collections on this business average 70 per cent, with the highest collection report made by any firm showing an 89 per cent collection of the accounts. Firms represented in the questionnaire reports so far compiled have been in business in Salem an average period of 24 years.
