

Jefferson Gets \$16,000 PWA Grant to Lay New Water Mains

Ballot Slated On Bond Issue

Beer Licenses of McKee, Tyson Renewed by City Council

JEFFERSON, Dec. 12. — The city council met Monday night in regular session in the council room with Mayor Edna B. Allen in the chair. Applications from McKee Bros. and Jack Tyson, for renewal of beer license were read and granted. The street committee was instructed to have Third street and other streets with chock holes, repaired.

\$7000 Federal Gift
Recorder Howell reported that he received word from John Heltzel, city attorney, saying that he has received a wire from U. S. Senator Chas. McNary at Washington that the city's application for \$16,000 PWA fund has been approved by the government. Of this amount, \$7000 is a federal gift and \$9000 must be raised by the city through a bond issue. The money to be used to lay new water mains and repair the reservoir.

The city will hold a special election to pass the bond issue as soon as the proper papers are drawn up and put in shape to hold the special election.

The contract to drill a new well for the city's water supply was left to Mr. Sloper, and the well will be put down immediately. It will be located on the corner lot on Third and Church streets.
