

Jersey Club Meet Is Set January 4

State Executive Board in Meeting Here Thursday Discusses Plans

Date for the annual meeting of the Oregon Jersey cattle club, of which Levi McKee of Perrydale is president, was set for Saturday, January 4, in Salem, at a meeting of the executive board of the state group held all day yesterday at the chamber of commerce here.

The annual meeting, which is expected to attract 150 Jersey breeders, is set earlier than usual this year in order to take advantage of a trip to the west of Dr. James D. Brew of New York City, formerly bacteriologist at Cornell university and milk consultant of the New York City board of health, and now milk specialist with the American Jersey cattle club. Dr. Brew will be the main speaker for the annual Oregon Jersey meeting and election of officers, tentatively set for the Marion hotel beginning at 10:30 a. m. The business session and election will precede the luncheon, following which a program will be given. In addition to Dr. Brew, T. R. Warren of Portland, western field representative of the American Jersey cattle club, will speak.

The board of directors yesterday approved a number of applications for use of the term Jersey in dairy products, and also

took cognizance of the reorganization last week of the Jersey cattle club for Tillamook county. Details for the program for the annual meeting will be announced later by Mrs. F. G. Kuensting of Woodburn, state Jersey secretary.

Students Going to Indianapolis Meet

Cost of County's Audit Not Known

Cost of the audit of the sheriff and tax collectors' offices in Salem has not yet been determined, the secretary of state's office said yesterday.

The audit charge will be based on the actual per diem amount paid each auditor working for the state plus the ratable amount of the audit department's overhead which should be assessed to the county.

Similar audits in future years would be less expensive, the department indicated, because a shorter period would be covered.

The department also stated that improvement in the bookkeeping system of the county would reduce the cost of the audit.

Curry county has applied to the state for an audit to be carried on by the state auditing department.

Marion county court officials have not yet determined whether or not they would ask the state to make the improvements in bookkeeping methods recommended in the report of the auditors.

Object to Fees On Light Trucks

Many complaints have been received by the state department here relative to changes in the motor vehicle license laws whereby all pickups, light city deliveries and trailers are required to pay a double license fee, or \$10 a year.

The law was changed at the regular 1935 legislative session and becomes effective January 1. The change was said to have been made without consulting Earl Snell, secretary of state, who has charge of the motor vehicle license bureau.

Snell has informed complainants that he has no authority to deviate from the law. The only vehicle now eligible to the \$5 fee is strictly a passenger car.
