

Road Project Being Mapped

Blanket Relief Task Has Approval; Six Units to Start Monday

Following word Wednesday that the county \$250,000 blanket project for county road projects had been approved by WPA, the county commissioners and County Engineer went into conference yesterday morning to get work under way at once.

As a result, the county hopes to get six projects under way by Monday morning, with about 40 men to be given work on these roads.

The projects on which work will begin at once are: Connecting route from the Liberty road to the river road south of Salem. This will start from

the school at Salem Heights, carry down the hill and over to the Croasun creek road. This, incidentally, will open up a broad area of fine farm land.

Improvement of Vista avenue south of Salem.

Improvement of Hoyt street from South 13th street, another project south of the city.

Improvement to the Fiddler road, also south of Salem, by widening, clearing brush and other needed changes. This road comes off the south rider road this side of Roberts.

Completion of the Moisan road in the Brooks district, a route which parallels the highways and forms a cutoff through fertile lands.

A drainage project for brushing, widening shoulders and otherwise improving the Wheatland and Champeez paved roads, starting from this side of the junction of the two roads at the McNary corner. The Homere road may also be put on for a similar drainage project.

Other road projects are contemplated and will be outlined later.

Foreclosure Will Proceed, Asserted

Taxpayers who wish to save any of 816 pieces of realty in Marion county from foreclosure Friday, December 20, must pay all back taxes and interest for 1930 and former years, together with the cost of advertising the property for sale, the sheriff's office announced yesterday.

The special session of 1935 did not remit back interest on property on which foreclosure had already been started, the sheriff's office advised. However, if the taxes through 1930 are paid up, the taxpayer may have the advantages of the new tax law in paying up the remainder of the delinquency.

The sheriff's office also warned that Saturday was the final day for paying the last quarter of 1935 taxes. Interest will begin on payments made thereafter although payments coming in by mail with a December 15 postmark will be credited without interest.

Weller Estate Is To Pay Large Tax

The estate of the late Charles S. Weller, Salem merchant, will pay a state inheritance tax of \$255,997 according to probate papers filed yesterday in court here.

Gross value of the estate was placed at \$132,827 with the net value after debts and administration expenses placed at \$118,394.

The first \$10,000 of the net estate is exempt from state tax. The remainder is \$108,394, one per cent; \$25,000, one and one-half per cent; \$25,000, two per cent; \$25,000, three per cent; remainder, five per cent.

Kellaher Appears At Bribery Probe

Voluntary appearance of Dan Kellaher, former state parole officer, before the Marion county grand jury marked the highlight yesterday in that body's investigation of an alleged contract between Kellaher and L. A. Banks, prison inmate, in which the latter agreed to pay Kellaher a release from the governor for \$50,000.

Kellaher emphasized that his appearance was voluntary and District Attorney Trindle confirmed the statement.

John R. Murphy, Kellaher's attorney, accompanied him to Salem but did not make an appearance before the jury.

Kellaher declined to comment on the charges against him but did talk with animation on the scheduled meeting at Mt. Angel December 16 when the creation of a power district in Marion county will be considered.

The jurors have given no indication as to the time they would complete their investigation on the Kellaher case and make their report.

Teacher Exam Set But System Going

School teacher exams—the age-old method by which the teachers of the three "r's" won their certificates—are on again here next week but the exams are rapidly coming to a decline in the state and by the time 1938 comes 'round will be a thing of the past.

The reason: After 1937, teachers can only be certified after they have completed two years' of normal school work. By 1941 that requirement will have gone up to three years' of normal school work.

Only half a score of teachers are expected to take the exams here beginning next Wednesday, December 18. The majority of teachers now serving in the county have completed normal school requirements. Many of the prospective teachers who will be examined want to complete their tests and to get life certificates which will not be possible under the exam method after 12 months more have elapsed.
