Six Pay in Full — Six counties in Oregon have paid their full taxes to the state for 1935, the state treasurer's office reported today. Multnomah county, in addition, has paid \$125,000 toward its fourth quarter payment at \$235,490.72. 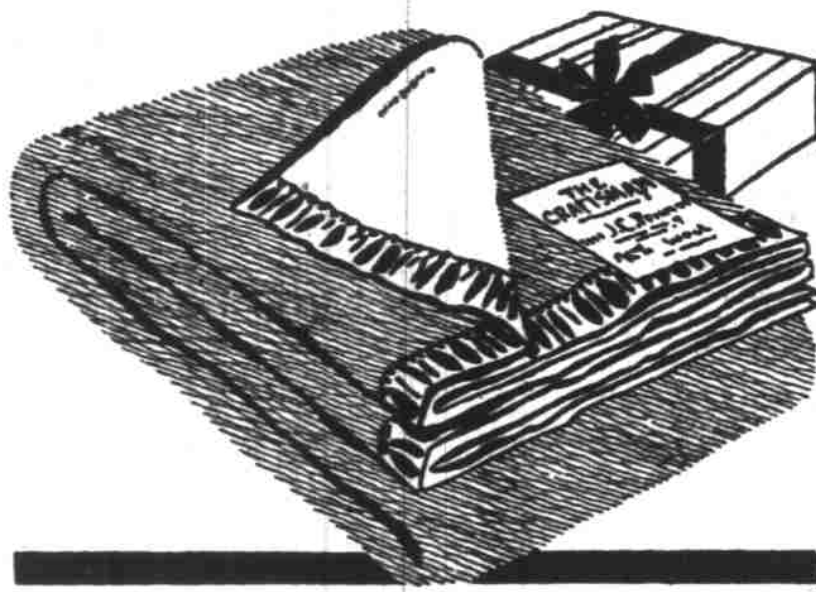
