

Reckless Driving Brings \$25 Fine

Dickey, Arrested on False Pretense Charge, to Give Plea Here

WOODBURN, Dec. 12. — The following cases appeared in Woodburn justice court the past week: Ray W. Johnson, for reckless driving, was fined \$25 and costs and given until December 31 to pay. Howard Dickey, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, on information filed by Raymond Clark, waived preliminary hearing and was held to answer to the circuit court with bail fixed at \$500. — Being unable to furnish bail he was committed to the county jail.



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H. E. Olafson was given a suspended fine of \$5 and costs of \$2.50, which he paid, for driving without an Oregon license. J. L. Hubbs, received a similar fine for also driving without an Oregon license. His fine was suspended and he paid the costs of \$2.50. George D. Taylor, for driving his car with four in the driver's seat, paid a fine of \$10 and costs of \$2.50.

Robert Morris Baker, arrested for driving a loaded truck, the combined weight being more than allowed by law and for driving without public utilities carrier plates, received a suspended fine of \$5 and paid the costs of \$2.50.

Load Too Heavy
John Keating, arrested for driving a truck at a speed of 50 miles per hour, paid a fine of \$10 and costs after entering a plea of guilty. He was also arrested for driving a truck with combined weight of truck and load weighing over 6,000 pounds and without public utility carrier license plates. He was given a suspended fine of \$5 and costs of \$3.50 for this offense.

Warren Gilbert Shaw, arrested for removing a motor from an Essex car and installing a Chevrolet motor in said Essex with notifying the secretary of state, was given a fine of \$10 and costs. Mike K. Smith, charged with the same offense, paid a fine of \$10 and costs of \$3.50.

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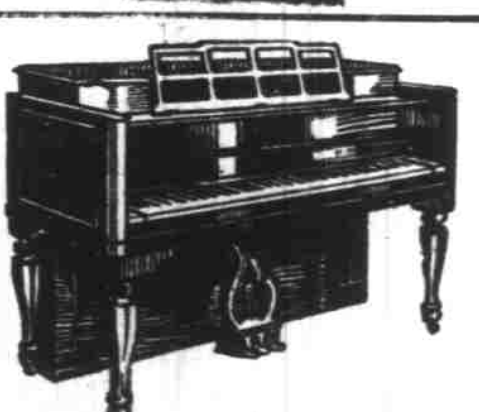
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
