## Recipes for Tea Cakes

Constitute Topic of Week

Following are more Christmas pudding recipes from last week:

**Carrot Pudding**

Cream together 1 tablespoon butter and 1 cup sugar. Add:

- 1 cup grated carrots
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup raisins (floured with part of above flour)
- 1/2 cup nutmeats
- 1 teaspoon soda dissolved in 2 tablespoons water
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon allspice
- Pinch of cloves and nutmeg

Mix in order given and steam in double boiler for 3 hours. Makes 8 generous servings. Letting on sauce or sweet cream makes an excellent complement.
