Sues For Fee — Herman A. Stone filed suit in circuit court yesterday asking for payment of a \$500 brokerage fee which he claims is due him from a sale of real estate which he consummated. Defendants named are C. L. Steele, Fannie Steele and Cecile Steele. Stone asserts he offered to sell a farm for the defendants and obtained purchasers in Charles F. Peters and Marie Peters. Stone files an alleged copy of the contract which the buyers and the defendants made. He asks the court to award him the fee, declaring he has fulfilled his function as broker and alleges the sellers should perform their contract.

Big dance Kent hall Sat. night. — Schirman Sues — A. E. Schirman yesterday filed suit against J. E. Parrish, asking for payment of a note for \$2400 signed by Parrish, allegedly, in 1933. Plaintiff asserts that \$1050 principal was paid on the note December 23, 1933, but claims no principal or interest has been paid since then. He also asks \$261.80, alleged back rent for sheep pasture land leased by Parrish to Schirman and the will of the late Cornelia M. Davis of Turner.

Vow Boys Are At Bowl Again

Secret Pledge to Revenge Defeats Is Rumored; SMU Entrains

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 26 (AP)—Stanford's "vow boys" returned to the Rose Bowl battlefield today for the third successive year, silently resolved to break their New Year's day losing streak at the expense of Southern Methodist University.

Captain Claude "Tiny" Thornhill brought 20 players here this morning and united them with the 18 members of the squad who had worked for Christmas. A hard workout followed.

There was a marked difference in the attitude of the two teams before the Columbia and Alabama games of the last two seasons. It was apparent this team, eight members of which have suffered from the defeats by eastern and southern invaders, is determined to wipe the Stanford Rose Bowl slate clean with a smashing victory.

There was no open pledge, such as these eight made in their freshman year when they resolved never to lose to Southern California. Yet there was every indication these athletes had made a secret vow to gain revenge.

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 26 (AP)—The Southern Methodist university football squad, in tip-top shape to a man, moved westward tonight for the Rose Bowl game with Stanford University at Pasadena.

Thirty-one players were aboard a train that departed at noon. With them went coaches Matty Bell, Vic Hurt and Charlie Trigg and a contingent of sports writers.

City Lien Binding On Private Buyer

City of Salem liens on properties involved in present county tax foreclosures are binding on private buyers at the sheriff sales where the county takes the deed, City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz said yesterday. The county, he declared, before selling property on which it has taken a tax deed, must give the city 20 days' notice to register liens.

Kowitz was working yesterday on complaints for foreclosure of properties on which improvement liens are in arrears but said that little action along this line could be taken until the county has completed its tax foreclosures since delinquent liens were generally accompanied by delinquent taxes. Between 200 and 400 pieces of city property are listed as delinquent in payment of improvement assessments or bond installations.
