Dr. Quigley was a Methodist Episcopal minister. Upon his retirement, they settled in Salem.

They have two daughters and one son living, Mrs. Roy Nelson, Salem, Mrs. Arthur Kniman, Grand Island, Nebraska, and D. H. S. Quigley of Minneapolis, Minn., who is chairman of the political science department of the University of Minnesota.

Professor Quigley was a Rhodes scholar at Oxford from 1911 until 1914. He took the Ph. D. degree at the University of Wisconsin. He is called Minnesota's authority on far eastern affairs, having taught two years in Peking and subsequently traveled and was a student in China and Japan. He has won distinction as lecturer and writer on international relations.

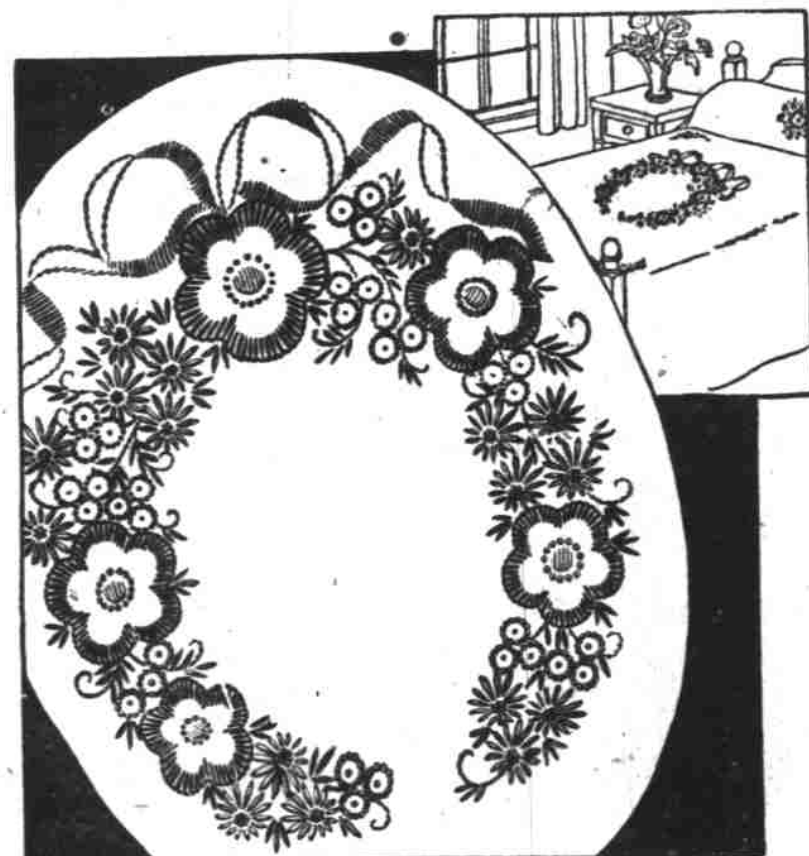
Professor Quigley's participation in the meetings of the American political science association at Atlanta made it impossible to have a family reunion on the golden wedding day so this is being planned for next summer.
