

Cardinals Smother Passing Attack of Mustangs; Win by 7-0

Game Without Usual Thrills

Paulman's Work Feature; Grayson and Wilson Do Not Shine

ROSE BOWL, Pasadena, Cal., Jan. 1. (P)—Stanford's light-hearted football players were serious today as they defeated Southern Methodist university 7 to 0 before a crowd of more than 85,000.

The only touchdowns of the game were scored when the first period was about three-quarters over. Bill Paulman, Stanford's sophomore quarterback, slanting off his own left tackle from the two-yard line to be the first, last and only player to count all day. Oddly enough, the winning touchdown was made possible by a forward pass, a weapon which Stanford was not supposed to know much about. The railbirds had thought Southern Methodist would do the throwing and Stanford the running. As it turned out, a 22-yard pass sent Stanford deep in Southern Methodist territory and led to the score.

Big Bowl Jammed
The big bowl was jammed to the hilt with excited humanity, paragon Texans, equally partisan Californians and other thousands who just came for the ride.

The big Stanford team showed early in the day that it had not come to the Rose Bowl to laugh. True in the last two years the Redskins have lost to eastern teams and their friends have said they took their New Year's chores too lightly. Their resolution this year was to get out in front and stay there and this they did, in spite of desperate efforts by the Mustangs from Dallas to overhaul them.

Eight members of the winning team today had played two previous games in the Rose Bowl with a horse collar for their share of the victories and they were determined today to show the football world could turn and would not be the same on the other side.

The game was not so exciting as had been forecast. Stanford picked up a first period touchdown and did not do much thereafter while Southern Methodist never could muster a consistent passing attack, although one smart forward followed by two later gave the visitors a slight lead on Stanford's five-yard line. This golden opportunity went glimmering when a fumble cost the attacking team possession of the ball.

Hoover Greets Notables
The capacity crowd included many distinguished citizens of the two big states supporting the battling eleven on the field.

Former President Herbert Hoover led the Stanford delegation and governors of both California and Texas sat on opposite sides of the field. During the game Mr. Hoover came across the arena to greet Governor Alford and Jesse H. Jones, a distinguished Texan who heads the Reconstruction Finance corporation.

Both teams showed better ball during the season than they did today in the annual east vs. west classic. At times the contest threatened to become dull and never was there the sustained excitement some other New Year's day classics have produced.

Stanford, after getting out in front, tried to increase its lead by passing when the Texans showed they were able to stop the running attack, but a Mustang almost intercepted a pass, with a clear shot ahead, so the Redskins quickly changed their tactics and held tenaciously to what they had. It developed this was enough.

The stars of the two teams fared rather badly. Bobby Wilson lived up to his reputation as a sensational runner by bringing the crowd up standing with a half dozen sprints, including one of 28 yards, but he was too badly rushed to do any effective passing. Iran Man Wetzel, S. M. U. guard, was injured and forced from the game early in the struggle.

Topping Outplays Moscrip
Keith Topping, Pasadena boy playing at home for the last time, outshone his more publicized teammate, "Monk" Moscrip, who figured in the scoring only to the extent of place-kicking the extra point after the touchdown.

Moscrip was in and out, making some sensational plays, but also slipping badly on others. Topping was consistently good. Paulman was the offensive and defense star of the Stanford backfield. The young quarterback played a sensational game on defense, was alert throughout and had a much better day on the whole than his All-American teammate, Bobby Grayson. Grayson never was able to get away, his longest run of the day being seven yards and he was tossed several times for five and six-yard losses.

Southern Methodist led in first downs, nine to six, and gained more total yardage, 187 to 160. The Mustangs gained 104 yards from passing and 44 for Stanford in its two completed tosses. S. M. U. attempted 31 passes and completed 10 while Stanford connected two out of six. Stanford, however, intercepted six of the Mustangs' throws while S. M. U. caught only one Stanford pass.

Fans Howl With Glee as Riggi in Comeback Puts Bee on Copper in Best Armory Match in Long Time

Frank Riggi, knocked down twice in the third round, became a bloody bomber as he came back in a fury of right and left jabs to win by an eighth round knockout over Tiny Cooper in the main event of Curly Feldman's fight card at the armory yesterday.

The curly haired Brooks Italian, weighing in at 130 pounds, was nearly put away by the blond Hubbard heavyweight in the early rounds but made a spectacular return to wind up one of the best and most exciting fights in the third round, sending a flurry of rights and lefts to the head that put Cooper on the canvas for the final count.

The fights had then early 1500 fans that jammed the armory bowing throughout the eight rounds. Only the first, punctuated by boos, was slow as the two evenly matched boys felt each other out.

Cooper Opens in Second
Cooper started his attack in the second and threw his right into Riggi's face forcefully until blood streamed from the Italian's nose. Cooper kept the advantage in the third round, sending a stream of heavy punches at the Brooks lad's head until he finally knocked him down with a steaming right. Riggi got up on the count of eight, but, apparently dazed, turned his back on Cooper who came from behind to again knock him down. Riggi got up on the count of nine and the two were slugfaring furiously in a corner when the bell ended the most exciting round of the fight.

Reverse Play With Grayson Carrying Winner, Says Bell

ROSE BOWL, Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1. (P)—A frown from lady luck, over-anxiousness and an "off day" on their aerial bombing cost the Southern Methodist Mustangs the chance for a Rose Bowl victory today, in the opinion of Coach Matty Bell.

"We played a great ball club today," Bell told his players as they soaked under the showers. "It's OK, it's OK—it just wasn't our day."

The lanky coach, who had guided the Mustangs through 12 straight victories and placed the southern team in the tournament of Roses classic, spotted one play as the "back-breaker."

That reverse, with Bobby Grayson carrying, that put Stanford on our three-yard line in the first period, decided the ball game. It dazed the boys for a minute and Stanford had its touchdown.

He referred to a 7-yard crack into the line by the battering Grayson shortly after the Indians had approached pay dirt on a long pass.

Fumble Turns Into 6 Points

Intercepted Passes Pave Way to Remainder of 19 to 3 Victory

KEZAR STADIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 1. (P)—East conquered West on the football field today with a 19 to 3 score that saw the boys from the sunrise side of the continent come from behind in the last period to make a rout of the eleventh intercollegiate classic played for charity.

On the short end of a 3 to 0 count just after the final quarter opened, the finest collection of stars assembled under the eastern banner in years snatched at a fumble and intercepted two passes to convert the break into touchdowns while nearly 60,000 fans cheered them on.

Score Rivals '20 One
The score was the most one-sided since 1928, when an eastern team won by a 20 to 0 margin, and completely justified the 2 to 1 odds which established the visiting squad as the favorite early in the practice period.

The first seven touchdowns followed recovery of a fumble made by Bill "Kay" Lam, University of Colorado halfback. It was Lam's second error of the game and a costly one as it turned the tide of battle and set the stage for reversal of what was leading up to an upset victory for the West.

Charlie Wasieck, big tackle from Colgate, fell on the ball on the West's 43-yard line. Getting up full power, the East smashed southward under impetus furnished by Ed Smith, New York university halfback, who came in as a substitute at left half. Paul Pauk of Princeton, subbing at right half, and Don Irwin, line backer from Colgate, a fullback replacement.

Ed Smith tossed a short pass to Pauk who ran 7 yards for the first score which changed the lead. Irwin converted the extra point with a place kick.

The next two touchdowns, made in quick succession, saw passes by Bill Wallace, Rice institute halfback, intercepted. Irwin snagged the first one, to give the East possession on the West's 26. Ed Smith ripped off 12 yards and Irwin converted the line drive and Irwin drove over the line on the last try, a 3-yard gain.

Receiving the kickoff, the West tried a pass on its own 10-yard line. This time Gomer Jones, Ohio State center, bobbed up, nabbed the oval and boomed around the West's right end for approximately 15 yards and the final touchdown. The place kick tries on the last two touchdowns were misaid by Irwin and Heekin, Ohio State halfback.

The East also failed on one kicking effort from the field. It was attempted by Russ Letlow, San Francisco guard, in the second quarter.

The victory was the fourth for the East since the game was established in 1925 and its first since 1931.

Gorilla Jones in Comeback Victory

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 1. (P)—Gorilla Jones, former middleweight champion, knocked out Tait Littman, Milwaukee, in the first round of a scheduled 10-round bout, to successfully launch his comeback campaign here today.

A capacity crowd of 6,000 saw the former Akron title holder send the Milwaukee blonde to the floor for a count of eight before the round was two minutes old. Littman got up but took a left hook to the body and another right to the chin and went down for the full count. It was Jones' first fight under the management of Joe Louis' handlers. Jones weighed 157 1/2, Littman 161 1/2.

Salem Improving As Sport Center

Patronage, Participation of All Athletic Games Gaining, Revealed

That Salem is becoming more sports-minded every year is shown in increased attendance and participation figures by nearly every Salem sport—amateur and professional during 1935.

Softball—the amazing sport that has swept the country in one big wave—led the field in popular appeal with the Salem softball association reporting a net profit of \$1,030 on its regular season and a profit of \$1034 on the state softball tournament.

Large crowds, attracted by fast and thrilling games, attended the softball sessions on Sweetland field four nights a week during the summer. An estimated 15,000 spectators helped the state softball tournament break all records for attendance at Salem sport events.

Basketball also had another successful year, climaxed by the state high school basketball tournament at Willamette university. Only the act that the Willamette gymnasium was sold out for most of the night games kept it from establishing a record. Attendance was good at Salem high and Willamette games through the season but never phenomenal.

Football Draws Better in 1935

Football showed an increase in interest, especially at Willamette. Attendance at Willamette's three home games was estimated at \$350 and that increased to \$511 by the 1934 figures of \$489 paid admissions for four home games. It was an average increase per game of 745 paid admissions. In addition approximately 1400 students attended the games, making a total home attendance of 7750.

The San Jose game, first of the season, nearly made a record when 2250 cash customers saw the tilt.

Attendance at Salem high games was good although affected to some extent by the Vikings' dismal season.

Many Thrills In Miami Play

Catholic Cardinals Nose Out Mississippi, 20-19; Passes Feature

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 1. (P)—In an intersectional football game filled with thrills, Catholic university's big red Cardinals edged out the lighter, late-rallying University of Mississippi eleven here this afternoon by the score of 20 to 19.

A feature of Miami's second annual Orange Bowl festival, the New Year's day classic drew to Miami stadium more than 10,000 paying spectators.

They sweltered in hot Florida sunshine and screamed as the game "Ole Miss" eleven, led by Ray Hapes, hammered across two touchdowns in the final period to whittle Catholic's big early lead down to the single point.

A break gave the Cardinals their final touchdown, in the third period—the touchdown that was to be needed. That score, too, gave big Bob Makofske, plunging Catholic fullback, his opportunity to book the placement kick for point that was the margin of victory.

Punts Check Invaders
Leading 13 to 6 as the second half opened, the Cardinals, wind at their backs, drove "Ole Miss" back with Makofske's long punts.

At last Dave Bernard, Mississippi quarter, dropped back to kick from his 24-yard line. The right side of the Catholic line battered through to block it. Rydzewski, reserve end, grabbed the tumbling ball in the air and dashed over. Makofske converted to make the score 20 to 6.

Hapes, injured in the first half as the husky, hard-charging Catholic line smothered the "Ole Miss" offense, came back to the game to fire the southerners with new life.

Taking the ball on their 30-yard line after intercepting an aerial, they hammered straight down the field, with the help of one 17-yard pass, to their second score, Bernard diving over from the one foot line. His placement try failed.

Not discouraged, they uncorked the aerial circus for which they were famous. Baumstein, reserve quarter, firing two passes to Poole, end, for 15 and 24 yards to score in the final minute of the game.

Richardson, big tackle, booted the point. Moments later the game ended, with Catholic holding the ball in midfield.

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Horned Frogs Win by 3 to 2

Sugar Bowl Sees 2 Strong Defenses Stop Repeated Marches

TULANE STADIUM, New Orleans, Jan. 1. (P)—An accurate place kick by Taldon Manton, held by Sam Baugh, provided the victory margin of 3 to 2 for the Horned Frogs of Texas Christian university over the Tigers of Louisiana State here today.

A record-breaking turnout of 35,000 for 1935's Sugar Bowl festival packed the stadium despite rain.

Louisiana took an early lead midway the second period when Texas Christian's all-around star, Baugh, dropped back to pass after a valiant goal line defense and stepped over the end zone, automatically giving the Tigers a safety.

Both elevens played cautiously throughout the first period, play being confined to a brilliant punting duel between Baugh and Abe Mickal, LSU's great triple threat fullback.

Early in the second period Louisiana State threatened with a drive that carried to the Frog's one-foot line.

The Frogs warded off the attack short of the goal line. Baugh dropped back in punt formation, attempted a pass but stepped behind his end zone.

Texas Christian then kicked to Louisiana's 40, where Ernie Seago fumbled and Willie Walls recovered for the Texans.

26-Yard Kick Wins

Three line smashes were checked by the Bengals and on fourth down Baugh knelt on the 26-yard line to hold the ball which Manton booted squarely over the goal posts for what proved the winning points.

Aside from the actual scoring, Louisiana State lacked the necessary power on two occasions as the Tiger machine rolled to the two yard line, only to be stopped. The Louisiana eleven also displayed defensive brilliance in halting a Texas drive, coming after a sparkling 44-yard run by Baugh to the Tigers' two-yard line early in the fourth period.

Freisinger Best Skater

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Jan. 1. (P)—Leo Freisinger, 19-year-old Olympic team member from Chicago, won the middle Atlantic men's speed skating title today, defeating his Olympic teammate, Allan Bots of Brooklyn.

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
