that amount. However, the new relief act for Oregon, passed in the last special session, provides that the state relief committee may pay "not less than one-half of the total cost of relief of every character" in a county. The measure leaves the state committee authority to increase its contribution if such addition is deemed imperative.

Large Appropriation Made by Legislature

The largest source of relief funds comes from the \$5,500,000 appropriation made by the state when the federal government was demanding assistance.

Up to December 1, 1935, the state had used \$2,564,205 of this sum to augment the moneys the federal government was giving the state. A portion of this came from cash profits on the liquor store operations; the balance came from the sale of \$1,665,000 of liquor revenue debentures. The latter have been steadily retired by the state and at present only \$700,000 are outstanding and these are held by the general fund at a two per cent interest return.

The remaining item of \$2,936,000 is an authorized appropriation for relief. The last special session did not abolish this fund; it merely transferred the moneys into a "public assistance fund." As additional relief needs arise, the state either can (1) issue more debentures or (2) use its cash from liquor revenues provided outstanding liquor debentures have been paid. As long as sizeable cash balances from the 1935 \$1,000,000 appropriation remain, and as long as \$400,000 is on hand from the federal government dole carryover, it is presumed the immediate income from liquor revenues will be used to retire debentures.

hands were folded across his body.

Neighbors, who saw the body through a window and notified officers of the death, said that they had seen a light burning in the bedroom of the house until after 2 o'clock Thursday morning. Police reported that the lamp still had oil in it but that the wick was badly burned, leading them to believe the light might have burned itself out.

Caswell had told his friends that he did not want to be a bother to anyone. His niece, Mrs. Magison, when informed of her uncle's death, was preparing to come to Salem, having just received the letter from him in the morning mail. His autopsy is to be performed this morning at the morgue. Whether an inquest will be held or not will depend upon the results of the investigation, he said.

Caswell was a bachelor and had lived on his 15-acre place near North Howell for a number of years. He is survived by a brother, Perry O. Caswell of Salem, two nieces, Mrs. Ara Magison of Portland and Mrs. Blanche McVeigh of Merritt, B. C., and two nephews, Harold Burtis of Portland and Jesse Jay Burtis of Seaside.

Funeral services for Caswell will be held Sunday at 2 p. m. from the Clough-Barrick chapel. Interment will be at Silvertown.

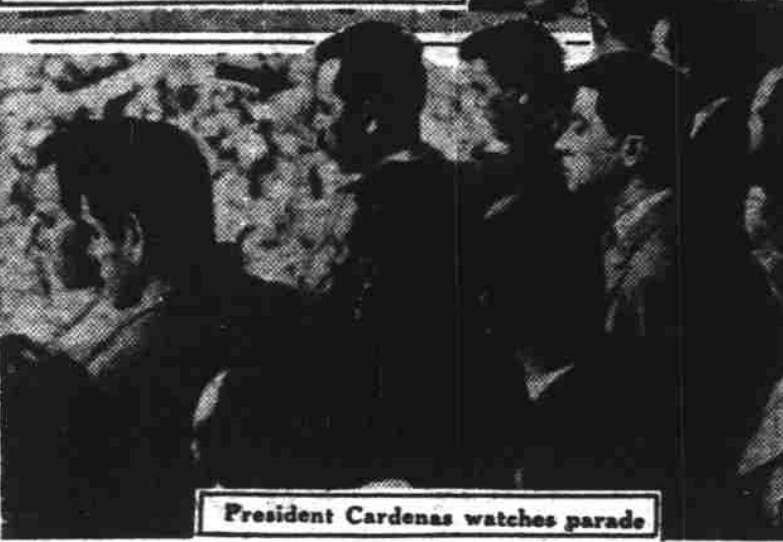

New Deal Behind On Straw Ballot

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The latest tabulation of the Literary Digest poll shows participants voting slightly more than three to two against the new deal.

Various Alternates May Be Eliminated

Plans on which a contract may be awarded to the low bidder, Drake, Wyman & Voss, Portland, provide for an auditorium seating 400 persons, a roomy library, 14 classrooms, two large playrooms and an unheated kitchen. The building is designed in T-shape, two stories high, with provision made for adding wings at either end and a balcony in the auditorium.

If all the alternates in the Portland firm's bid are eliminated, as may be necessary to bring the project's cost within the board's means, there would be no floor covering, seats or stage equipment in the auditorium, no new desks for the fourth, fifth and sixth grade rooms, and no linoleum in the corridors. Stucco would be substituted for the brick facing originally planned for the exterior and the corridor floors would be of nonskid concrete.

Accused Says Self Defense

Unknown Invader Choked Him in Dark; Didn't Recognize Sloan

from his house in the Broadacres district near Hubbard.

The district attorney's office was prepared to file the murder charges today, it was announced.

Kyle said Sloan and he had been in Salem New Year's afternoon to attend the boxing matches here, then had returned to Kyle's house and had drunk considerably of whiskey Kyle made. Officers reported that Kyle had been heavily intoxicated when they got to his house at 4 a. m. yesterday. Kyle told neighbors of the shooting and made no resistance when officers came to take him. He was unmoved by the killing when arrested but late yesterday showed signs of remorse when interviewed in the county jail.

Kyle, sober, told his side of the fatal fracas from behind the jail bars yesterday.

He said he had gone to bed when he was awakened by someone in the room who came over to the bed and grasped Kyle's throat. Kyle said he struggled, then grabbed his .32-caliber revolver from under his pillow. He said he did not know how many times he fired or who his assailant was.

Kyle declared he told the man he could have all of the money he had—between \$40 and \$45. When the man fell, Kyle said, he left his house and hurried to the Sloan house, about 100 yards away. He called for "Jean" he said and the latter's mother answered that "Jean" had not come home.

Kyle then said he went to the house of Joe Henry Smith, next nearest neighbor, and got Smith to go back to Kyle's house. There, according to Kyle, Sloan's body was found slumped on Kyle's bed.

"He was my best friend. We had been good neighbors," Kyle said. "I didn't know who I was shooting; I shot to protect myself."

Kyle said he and Sloan had started for Salem on Wednesday afternoon in Sloan's car. When the car broke down, Kyle said the two men went back to Kyle's house, got his car, towed Sloan's car into Woodburn and then came on to see the fights in Salem.

The two men had been drinking considerably, the prisoner declared. He said they ate at a Chinese restaurant in Salem, then drove home, had some beer and later in the evening drank some whiskey.

There had been no card game at the house, Kyle averred. Police reported that Kyle's house was very disorderly. In a chickenhouse nearby Kyle said a still which was not in operation when officers came. Kyle had an elaborate system of alarms, the chickenhouse where the still was being connected with an electrical buzzer which ran into the main house. Kyle had also installed an elaborate system of "peepholes" in the walls of his house where he could observe anyone approaching. Officers said that he had arranged a trapdoor in the side wall of the house next to his bed where by pulling a wire he could open the door and look out at the chickenhouse which housed his still.
