Quot Use Fund—No part of the state restoration fund, which now exceeds \$100,000, can be used for the reconstruction of the state capitol. Attorney General Van Winkle held an opinion Saturday. Van Winkle said the existing restoration fund would prove wholly inadequate for that purpose. The opinion further held that the state board of control has no authority to start a new restoration fund. The 1935 appropriation of \$25,000 shall be added to the existing restoration fund, he continued.

Brooks Honored—Russell M. Brooks, son of Mrs. Mildred Brooks, county recorder, has been recommended for nomination to an advanced position with the United States foreign service according to word from Washington. D. C. He is now stationed at Caracas, Venezuela and is scheduled to remain there another year. With his wife, Mr. Brooks visited here last fall. He was educated in Salem. His consular posts have included assignments to Ireland and to England.

Gravely Ill—Mrs. Burton J. Tax Boosted—By stipulation between the state treasurer's office and Alois Keber, executor of the will of the late Ernest Kural, the value of the estate for purposes of state inheritance taxes has been increased \$1000 to \$7286. The increase is due to reappraisal of a note of James C. Austin and Mabel H. Austin at \$2500 instead of at \$1500. Face of the note is \$3000. State inheritance taxes will be \$324.

Women Assigned—Additional assignments of women to the WPA sewing project which is to reopen Monday in the Chambers building, were requested yesterday by S. W. Richardson, project supervisor. The new assignments will be for jobs beginning Thursday. Richardson said they would include all eligible women in Salem and West Salem not included in the assignments issued Monday.

Election notices are being printed and bids have been called for on ballots. Completion of the number of persons who have registered for the election continues.

Night Agriculture Classes Arranged

Night classes in agriculture and agricultural laboratory will be offered to boys and young men in the vicinity of Salem beginning Wednesday night by the Smith-Hughes agricultural department of Salem high school in cooperation with the state board for vocational education. Ralph L. Morgan, agricultural instructor, announced yesterday. The classes will be free of charge and meet from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. each Wednesday.

The studies will cover such fields as dairying, sheep, swine and poultry raising, soils and soil fertility, farm crops, seed production, small fruits, tree fruits and testing and judging of soil, milk and grain. Specific problems of the students will be concentrated on, Morgan said. The students interested in dairying will be eligible for membership in the newly organized cow testing association, one of the cooperative movements sponsored by the agricultural department.

The classes will be held in room 1-C located on the ground floor of the senior high school building.

Health Survey Is Widespread

Most Comprehensive Task of Kind Ever, Reports McGill, Supervisor

The survey of chronic disease and disabling illness in progress in Salem is part of what is probably the most comprehensive health survey ever attempted in the United States, according to K. H. McGill, of Oakland, Calif., who arrived here yesterday to advise with the local survey staff headed by Dr. F. Howard Karris. McGill is regional supervisor over California, Oregon, Washington and Utah for the United States Public Health service, sponsor of the survey.

Three other cities in Oregon, Portland, St. Helens and LaGrande, and still 16 others in his region are the scenes for these survey studies, aimed at providing the health service and the medical profession with reliable guide information regarding chronic disease and disabling illness, the supervisor said. Nearly all of the other 16 states in which these surveys are in progress are east of the Mississippi river.

Generally throughout the Pacific region the survey enumerators are being received courteously and their questions answered. McGill stated. In some cities, he said, residents have become interested in the survey to the extent that they came voluntarily to the survey offices to be interviewed.

Dr. Karris said the same experience was being had in Salem, with more than 400 interviews with family heads already completed. He now has a staff of 40 workers, including 22 interviewers, clerks, and checkers who study each interview report to see that it conforms to the health service requirements. The enumerators are now working on the area between Broadway and Capitol street north of Madison street.

McGill expects to spend most of this week assisting Dr. Karris and his staff.

Brew, milk specialist for the American Jersey Cattle club, to stress the fine points of Jersey milk and of the breed to increase their sales and secure premium prices. Speaking at the afternoon session, he outlined Jersey dairymen's activities throughout the nation and studies made by the American club.

Yesterday was the first holiday the old clock had had within its memory, Chief of Police Frank A. Minto said. Minto joined the department in 1921 and became chief in 1923.

How old the clock, driven by a weighted cylinder, is, no present member of the force was certain. Chief Minto said he understood it dated back to the days when policemen wore "bobby" helmets and thick moustaches.

The old clock's ailment had not been diagnosed last night.

Arts League Will Offer One-Acters

Salem Arts league will offer as its January program a series of three one-act plays now in rehearsal by members of Salem Civic Players, according to an announcement of Mrs. Jessie Singleton, president of the Arts league. As it is the policy of the league to present Salem artists this preparation of one-act plays will be one of the features of the year. Salem painters were given recognition early in the season; and later, Salem writers.

This presentation, to which the Salem public is cordially invited, will be given at the Salem Women's club building on the night of January 15. For the past 15 years, the Arts league, with a few exceptions, has given its programs in the auditorium of the city library, but as the auditorium has been changed into a children's room, the league must find other auditoriums.

The three plays to be presented are: "The Third Man," with Elizabeth Smith, Leon Norris, June Lochridge, and Lucille Mosher in the cast; "G-Man," with Keith Middleton, Fred LaDue, and Elizabeth Smith as the players, and "A Weakness for Nurses," a revival of last season's successful comedies, with June Lochridge, Billy Mudd, Gene Holman, and Elsie Holman as the players.

Rehearsal of the plays, which was interrupted by the holidays, was resumed Friday night. Perry Prescott Reigelman is directing.

Orders Piling Up For Coast Mills

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 6 — A total of 201 down and operating mills in Washington and Oregon which reported to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending December 28 produced 60,187,793 board feet of lumber. This was approximately 42,500,000 feet under the preceding week, the decrease being due to the holiday shutdown. The average weekly production of this group of sawmills in 1935 has been 76,699,584 feet; during the same period in 1934 their weekly average was 66,256,635 board feet.

The new business reported last week by 201 mills was 112,424,860 board feet against a production of 60,187,793 feet, and shipments of 83,784,132 feet. Their shipments were over production by 23.2 per cent and their current sales were 86.8 per cent over production. The orders booked last week by this group of identical mills were approximately 4,000,000 feet under the total for the preceding week.

A group of 201 identical mills whose records are complete for both periods show total orders for 1935 of 4,264,738,000 board feet compared with 3,353,276,000 board feet for 1934, an increase of 27 per cent.

Ask Extension on Heating Program

The state board of control Friday authorized Governor Martin to ask the work progress administration for an extension of the federal grant of \$350,000, for construction of a central state heating plant and telephone exchange here, until March 1.

Under the terms of the original grant actual work on the projects was to begin not later than January 15.

Governor Martin declared that it would be impossible to complete the plans and specifications by January 15 and an extension of the grant was necessary.

Secretary of State Snell agreed to the extension. State Treasurer Holman was not in attendance at the meeting.

Night College to Launch New Term

Variety of Courses Given Here; "Persuasion" Newly Offered

Subjects ranging from decorative arts to ways and means of improving every day English will be offered at Salem's "night shift" of college and university courses, to be sponsored here again by the general extension division of the state system of higher education. It was announced Saturday by Bernard Hinchshaw, of the extension division, who was here to make final arrangements for the work.

A new course, "Decorative Art," will be added to the six that were started last term, and new students will be admitted to this as well as any of the others. It is announced. For those who complete the courses and pass the final examinations, two hours of credit will be allowed.

Classes will again meet in the Salem high school from 7:15 to 9:15 once each week. The first will be held tomorrow, January 8, and registration may be made at class time, or full information obtained at the high school.

"Persuasion" Offered
Of special interest will be the course in public speaking, which this term is called "Persuasion." Not only will extempore and other forms of speaking be taken up, but good English usage, methods of logically presenting arguments and other phases will be included. It will be taught on Wednesday by W. A. Dahlberg, professor of speech at the University of Oregon and a recognized authority in this field.

The new course in art will be taught by Leo Fairbanks, artist from Oregon State college. It will include much material that will be of practical interest, whether the student is an artist or not. This class will meet on Monday.

Other courses, instructors and meeting nights are: "Educational Psychology," by H. R. Laslett, Monday; "Shakespeare," by Miss Margaret Clarke of the extension division, Tuesday; "American National Government," Dr. Waldo Shumacher, Wednesday; and "Social Education," on Friday and "Modern Educational Principles and Practices," on Saturday, by Dr. C. L. Huffaker.

County Tax Sale Again Held Over

Marion county's third sale of properties for taxes was again continued yesterday by Sheriff A. C. Burk after 10 pieces of real estate went to bidders for taxes accrued against them. Another sale will be held Saturday, January 11. Where the properties are sold to the original holders taxes must only be paid through 1935. Where new buyers acquire the property the county asks that the claims up to and including 1935 be paid.

A number of purchasers have been asked, officials said, due to questions about the validity of the titles acquired. Abstractors here ask that a suit to quiet title be carried through or quit claim deeds from all persons who have held title be secured, before clear title can be given.
