Baseball's Clouting King



HEADING the parade of major league hitters is a young man whose sudden rise to batting glory was one of the most spectacular developments of 1935. Floyd "Arky" Vaughan, 25-year-old Pittsburgh swatter, really outclassed the other big league batters last year, winning the hitting laurels with a margin of 32 points over his nearest rival.

The Pirate walloper, hailed as a second Home Wagner by Smokey City fandom, has a highly individual batting style. Like many great hitters, he is a most unorthodox batter. Al Simmons and Lefty O'Doul, to mention a couple of former batting kings, both had peculiar hitting styles, and Vaughan, too, doesn't swing according to any baseball Hoyle.
