NEW YORK, Jan. 6-(AP)-Shares lurched irregularly lower in heavy turnover today on the stock exchange as investors and traders sought to interpret the supreme court's invalidation of the AAA and the president's budget message.

Issues of the companies which have been paying processing taxes advanced, while a wide scattering of equities sagged under pressure of selling from those who judged lower farm income might result from the elimination of the new deal's agricultural measure. which arose in many Wall street minds over the possible market will get under way. effect of the AAA decision tended to obscure the influence on trading psychology of the government's fiscal program.
