

First Dirt is Turned for New Gymnasium at Mt. Angel School

Business Men Witness Rites

Actual Construction Will Start Immediately In Angel Court

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 7.—At a special ceremony, held at 9 o'clock on the hilltop this morning in the presence of an assembly of Mt. Angel business men, officials of Mt. Angel college and the entire student body, Rt. Rev. Thomas Meier, abbot of the Benedictine monastery, at Mt. Angel, turned the first shovel of dirt for the new gymnasium.

Actual work on construction will begin immediately. Barrett and Logan are the architects. The building will be a permanent construction in the same style as the other college buildings. It will be located in the former Angel Court, within the triangle formed by the forks of the road leading up the hill and the present tennis courts.

The building will be a combined gymnasium and auditorium, and will have a double handball alley at one end, as well as whatever other rooms are necessary for service and storage. The erection of the gym will be another great stride towards the final goal of the rebuilding of the complete college unit. The building will be ready for use by next September.

Start Student Teachers

Practice teaching by the students of Mt. Angel Normal was begun Monday in St. Mary's public school. These student teachers will take the place of the regular teachers for certain classes each day for a period of two weeks.

During the first week Miss Walker and Miss Lee will teach the first grade; Miss Schuck and Miss Olsen, the second; Miss Waske the fourth; Miss Begin the fifth; Miss Bigler the sixth; Miss Hasting the seventh, and Miss Eber the eighth. The second week, Miss Roach and Miss Manning will have charge of the first grade; Miss Henshore the second; Miss Brogan the fourth; Miss Hunt the fifth; Miss Burch the sixth; Miss Gros Jacques and Miss Aarhus the seventh, and Miss Brockhaus the eighth.

Continue Rural Room

The rural school experiment which was tried out for the first time and with evident success last year will be used again. This consists of one room arranged as a complete rural school, with grades from beginners to eighth grade represented by several pupils chosen at random from the regular St. Mary's school roll. The purpose of the school is to give the student teacher practice in meeting the problems of an all grade school room. The rural school room will be conducted for a period of 10 weeks, extending from January 6 to March 20.

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Bond Resale Is Necessary

Advertising Period Short, Securities Company Advises City

SILVERTON, Jan. 7.—Because the Silverton city improvement bonds were advertised one day short, they will have to be re-advertised and resold, according to report made at the city council Monday night. The bonds were advertised December 13 and 20 and sold December 27. They will now be re-advertised January 10, January 17, and January 24 and sold January 28. The letter calling attention to the error was from the Federal Securities company, the company whose bid had been accepted.

Besides the formal report of the city treasurer, M. G. Gunderson, Mr. Gunderson appended a note to the effect that he had in his hands \$55 which had been deposited by J. E. Hosmer toward a refund of the cutting of a corner there was voted in the affirmative. It was explained, that while the council later decided not to cut the corner for the present, the telephone company had made the change in good faith and was not responsible for the change at the council.

Applications for card and billiard tables at the establishments of Arthur Heater, C. W. Kelly and Frank Joerg were accepted. The matter of renewing the city treasurer's bond was left in the hands of the finance committee. The recorder was instructed to subscribe for the automobile registration service again.

Sidewalks reported in need of repair were those of Virginia Rowan and R. W. Davis. The recorder was instructed to notify the owners.

A communication of A. E. Torgeson at 906 First street, was read reporting the unsanitary condition on the street near his residence, caused by overflow from the sewer at that point. Particularly was this condition bad during stormy weather. Mr. Torgeson reported, the matter was left in the hands of the health, fire and water committee.

A resolution, No. 240, amending one recently passed to correct errors in city and county records in reference to the names of streets at Silverton was passed. Mayor E. W. Garver instructed the finance committee to secure advice on the handling of the delinquent street assessments of those who did not refrain from using city ordinance past last spring. The committee was instructed to report back at the next meeting of the city council.
