## Portland Five Rated Strong

Keene's Boys Are in Good Condition, Clicking in Practice Now

"Spec" Keene, hoping that his Bearcats continue in the same swift and flashy fashion they displayed in their first three games, will match them against two strong independent quintets in a double-header engagement starting at 7:30 tonight on the Willamette floor.

The strong Multnomah club team, noted out by Oregon 44 to 36 last week, will furnish opposition for the varsity quint in the night cap tilt while the second string Bearcats will take on the Valley Packing team of the City Y league in the opening game.

Keene finished out a week of post-holiday practice for his Bearcats yesterday afternoon with the satisfaction of knowing that they are back in condition. In practice this week the combinations that went so well against Drake, Oregon State and Oregon have been clicking again while several members of the second string have shown great improvement.

Three Starters Sure While Keene has not definitely decided who pair of forwards he will start against the Clabbers it is certain that Bill Anton, husky Greek center, and Captain George "Finn" Erickson and Charley Versteeg, guards, will be on the floor when the whistle blows.

Whether Keene will start Manning and Mesher, the veteran forward combination, or Gastineau and Weaver, the freshmen pair that flashed against Oregon State and Oregon, will not be known until just before game time.

The Multnomah quint, consisting of former college stars, is rated as strong competition. Although defeated twice by the University of Oregon Webfeet the Clabbers have put up strong opposition in both games.

O'Connell is Star "Skeet" O'Connell, former Oregon State ace, and "peaches" Leach have been the big guns in the Multnomah victories. Coach Smith will probably start "Red" Gette of softball fame and Leach at forward, Lenchitzky at center, and Eustace and O'Connell at guard. The varsity tilt is scheduled to open at 8:30.

Against the Packers Keene will probably start Brandon and Gustafson, forward; Mullin, center, and Harvey and Ragsdale, guards.

The Valley Packing team also includes such former stars as Johnny Kelley, "Squee" Kitchen, Bob Ashby and Os Morley.

## Light Heavies to Spar at Spokane

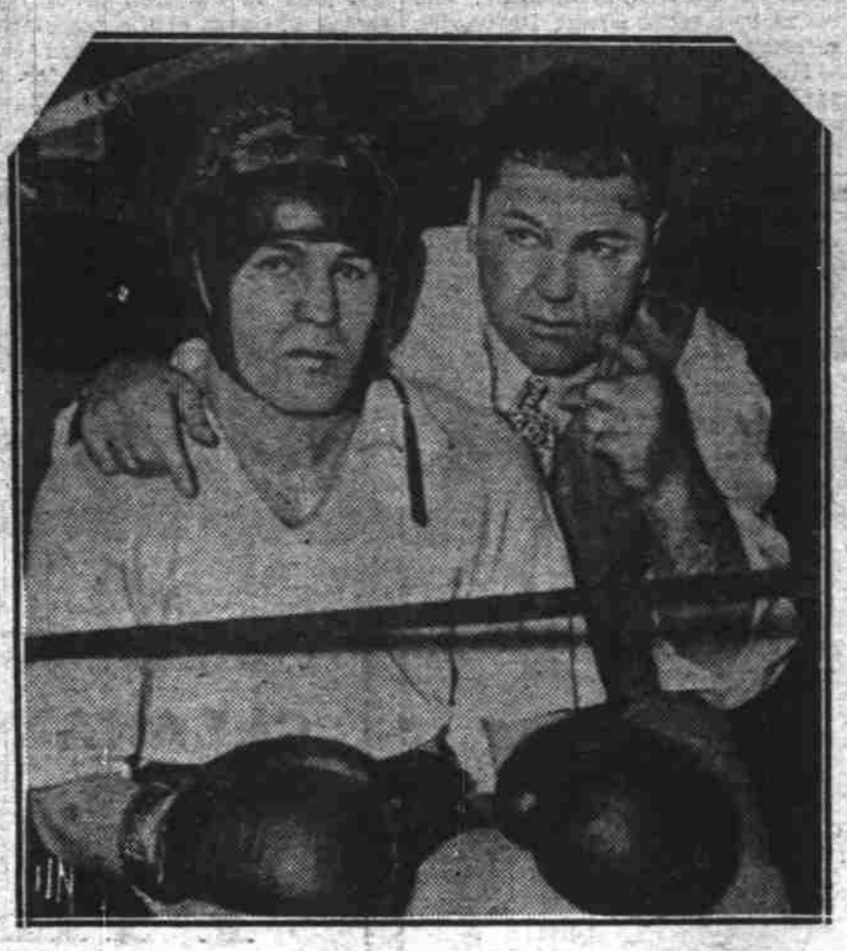

## Stanford Grider Is Deemed Insane

Worry Over Big Game Part of Cause, Is Belief; Confined Before

SAN JOSE, Calif., Jan. 9.—(AP)—Dale Dean Beedle, 20, Stanford University football player, was committed to the Agnew state hospital today as the anti-climax to stellar performances on the gridiron that helped his alma mater win the Rose Bowl, New Year's

The 198-pound, 6 feet 2-inch youth from Miami, Arizona, was sent to the hospital by Superior Judge William F. James after an examination by Drs. E. E. Porter and C. E. Moore. An insanity warrant had been sworn to by Patrolman John Collins.

Collins removed Beedle from a north-bound train this morning after the youth had caused disturbances throughout the night. The warrant contained charges of hallucinations, acts of violence and irrational talking.

Worry Held Cause At the hospital, Dr. E. C. Mullin, superintendent, expressed belief Beedle's breakdown was due to acute worry and overwork.

The doctor said nervous tension over the Rose Bowl game and possibly over studies might have caused Beedle's collapse. The psychiatrist said he believed the youth would recover with no ill effects.

It was revealed Beedle had been an inmate at Agnew for two months early in 1934, later entering the Arizona state hospital. He was released as completely recovered. Examining doctors at the time were of the opinion playing football would prove beneficial to him.

Stanford emphasized the belief that an injury sustained in football was not responsible for his present condition.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Five United States sportsmen challenged for the Grand National steeplechase classic today. They nominated six horses, one of them American-bred, for the world's most trying jumping test, which will be renewed at Aintree March 27.

The four and one-half mile race over 30 difficult jumps, won three times by American owners, drew a field of 54, six less than last year, when Major Noel Furlong's Reynoldstown was the victor.

The American contingent is headed by J. B. Snow's veteran, Delaneige, and Alvin Untermeyer's Bagatelle 2d.

G. H. "Pete" Bostwick again nominated Castle Irwell, the Irish-bred jumper with which he stayed up among the leaders for more than half the distance last year. John Hay Whitney placed his confidence in Double Cross and Royal Hanson. Jesse Metcalfe, a consistent challenger for Grand National honors, named Kiltol, which was scratched last year.
