

Portland Sea Contacts Many

52 Shipping Lines Touch 135 Ports, Rotary Told by Clerk

Through 52 shipping lines, Portland has direct contact with 135 ports, said Willis K. Clark of Portland, executive of the States Steamship company, in addressing Salem Rotarians Wednesday. These are the lines calling regularly at Portland. The value of the business done by vessels in Portland in wages paid, supplies purchased, etc., amounts to around \$15,000,000 a year.

These ship lines have developed new markets for Oregon produce. Two years ago 300 cars of onions were shipped to Manila, developing an overseas market for the Labish product. Oregon is vitally concerned with keeping up its ocean port and commerce.

Barriers Named
Clark pointed out three barriers to the shipping industry. First, restrictive tariffs and quotas tend to hamper trade, and might be modified to mutual advantage. Second, there is lack of a fixed subsidy policy. Now the subsidy is paid in the guise of mail payments. Direct subsidy would be more honest and is needed to keep a merchant fleet on the ocean since foreign wages are less and foreign subsidies greater. Third, the "union labor racket" has a stranglehold on coast shipping. The awards of the arbitration boards, handpicked by the A. F. of L. are violated not once but thousands of times and the union leaders disclaim any responsibility.

Clark said the unions had made the docks a perfect closed shop and a non-union worker who ventured there would be killed or beaten up. He pleaded for reforms in the labor situation which would stabilize conditions so ships could operate.

Hogs Are Higher But Pork Lower

Despite a \$1 advance of pork on the hoof in the period since the supreme court announced its AAA death decision, consumers were yesterday being given the advantage of a two to three-cent drop in pork prices by some meat markets.

Flour is now going to the consumer at about 30 cents a sack cheaper than before the AAA opinion, also due to lifting of the processing tax. Sugar advanced 10 cents a sack yesterday, but on the other hand, lard was down two cents a pound, though some observers do not expect it to remain at the cheaper figure long. Food commodities which may have a change in price due directly to the supreme court ruling on the AAA are listed by local dealers to include flour, sugar, rice, rice products, syrup, molasses, corn, corn products, fresh and canned pork, tobacco, candy, any product with sugar in it, macaroni, crackers, panaceas flour and similar foods. In addition, paper of all kinds is affected. Dealers here have not had definite indication of what price trend most of these commodities will take as result of the AAA decision.

Scio Postoffice Has 6 Per Cent Gain Past Year

SCIO, Jan. 9.—Postal receipts at the Scio office increased approximately 6 per cent during the past year, according to figures submitted by E. Phillips, Scio postmaster. Postal receipts for 1934 were \$3723.58, and for 1935 they totalled \$3941.15, a net increase of \$217.57. Money orders issued in 1935 were \$21,845.85, an increase of \$2,013.65 over 1934 when receipts were \$19,832.20. Postmaster Phillips stated that a large percentage of money orders were sent to mail order houses.
