

Heavy Winds Blow Away Third of Schoolhouse Roof at Turner

Storm Leaves Country Dark

Farmers of South Bottom Find Some Good in High Waters

TURNER, Jan. 13.—The Turner school house was badly damaged by the storm Saturday night. At least one-third of the roof was torn off and blown away, with rain doing considerable damage to the interior of the building. A crew of men worked Sunday replacing the damaged part of the roof with corrugated roofing. School was necessarily postponed till Wednesday morning.

Mill Creek overflowed its banks as usual during high water, but with less water than at former times, causing little real inconvenience, as traffic was not hindered. Several basements were found to not be waterproof. The electric lights went out of commission early Sunday morning and the storm did some damage to telephone lines.

Power Lines Down
NORTH HOWELL, Jan. 13.—Electric service was entirely out of order through this rural section all day Sunday due to lines and poles being blown down in the Lashish neighborhood. Some of the lines were down in the water and much difficulty was experienced getting them up and in place. A crew of men worked all day Sunday in a driving rain and wind storm and at 9 o'clock Sunday night the service was in use again.

Pruning in Recess
LIBERTY, Jan. 13.—Liberty has a rather flooded appearance since the heavy rains. Fields, yards and roadsides are awash, crops full of water, and even roads under water. Pruning, which was going on in many orchards, has come to a standstill. A few days of clear weather, or even of less rain, usually is sufficient to allow flood waters to drain off, and the countryside assume its normal aspect.

ROSEDALE, Jan. 13.—On account of the storm and high water, no church services were held here Sunday night.

Soil is Benefited
CLEAR LAKE, Jan. 13.—South Bottom is enjoying a little high water today. A few of the residences are cut off from the highway, but the road is still open east up the LaFollette hill. The road south of the Clear Lake bridge is under water and the mail and the school bus have been looping back around Keizer for several days. Most of the farmers welcome a flood of 25 feet as the fields are nearly all covered and the water has washed the soil and the sediment deposited over the surface.

LAKE LABISH, Jan. 13.—This district is truly a "lake" now as a result of torrential rains. Much of the lake land was flooded last weekend and the water rose steadily as the storm continued. The fill across the lake ground between the Lashish Center store and Brooks was under water Sunday afternoon. Electric power was off until 2:30 p. m. yesterday. Cold breakfasts and dinners were the results for users of electric ranges.

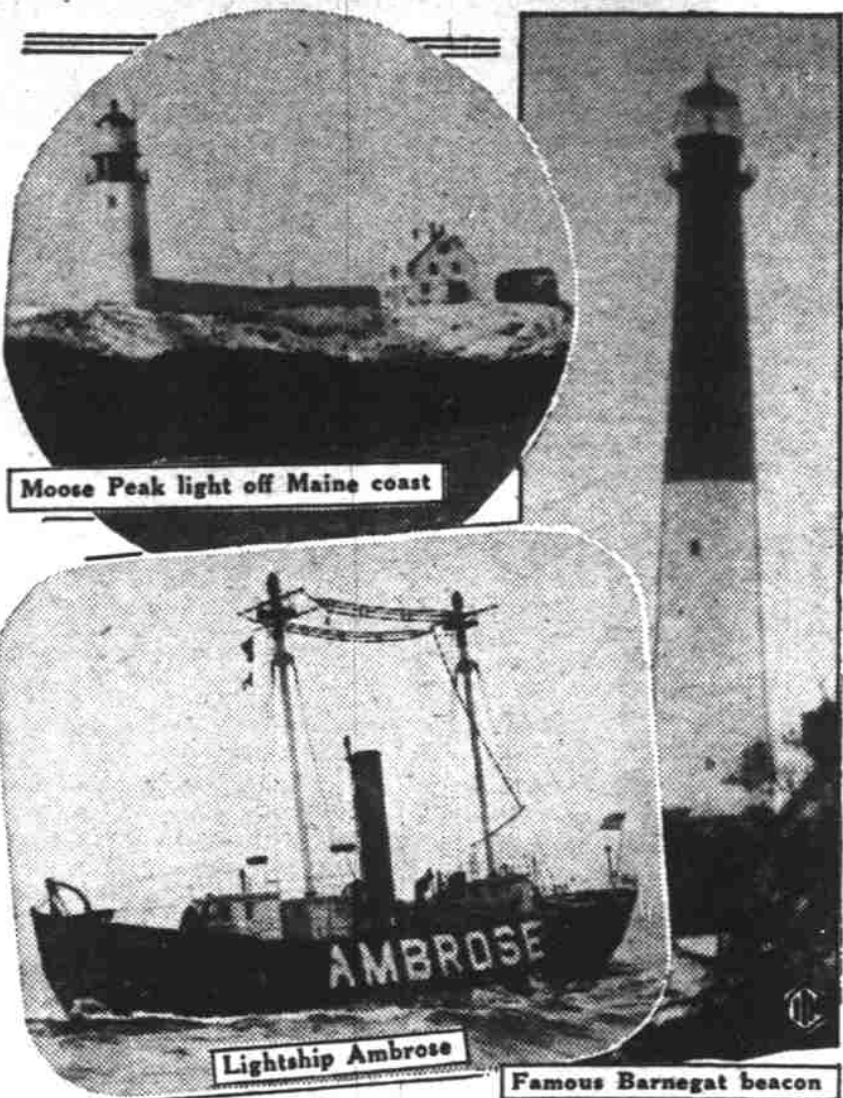
Bradford Clothiers To Meet Mount Angel

Robots Man Lighthouses



This modern age of mechanization is extending its influence to another branch of government service—lighthouses and lightships. Stations and lightships operated by remote control have been successfully established and 1936 promises to see additional innovations in the service which protects our continental and inland shores. Automatic lights started by an electric eye which operates a switch when daylight falls—fog horns which go into action when the atmospheric moisture increases—these are examples of the revolutionary new methods being put into effect. Although 250 new major lights have been put into operation since 1931, the number of keepers has decreased by 154, showing the effects of mechanizing this branch of government service which is fast becoming a highly complicated science.

Jefferson Voters Approve \$9000 Bond Issue for New Water System; Wooden Mains Will Be Constructed

JEFFERSON, Jan. 13.—In spite of stormy weather, a large majority of the voters turned out to the special election held Saturday in the Humphrey building to vote on a \$9000 bond issue to match the \$7000 gift from the government in financing a new water system for the city of Jefferson. The bond issue carried. Of the 141 votes cast, 80 votes were cast in favor of the issue.

The \$16,000 has been found not to be sufficient to cover the laying of iron pipes, but would be enough to lay a complete system of mains if wooden pipes are used. The majority of the people of Jefferson expressed their preference for wooden pipes because it will eliminate the possibility of rust.

Delay in Calling Bids
Application for PWA funds as accepted by the government stipulated that iron pipes would be used; and a resolution had to be sent to the PWA headquarters asking consent to alternate with wood pipes; thus there will be a delay in calling for bids until word is received from headquarters.

Labor to be employed on this project will be divided into two classes. Fifty per cent of the help used will be local men not on relief rolls and the other 50 per cent of the labor hired will be taken from the relief roll. If there are not enough local men on relief, the remainder of this 50 per cent will then be taken from outside relief rolls.

A place will be designated later where local men wishing to work on this project may register.
