

School Plan Strikes Snag

**Movement For New Building
at Scio Is Started,
But No Funds**

SCIO, Jan. 17.—The movement for a new high school building in Scio struck a snag Monday when C. C. Hockley, Portland, state PWA administrator, stated that no more funds were immediately available. An application blank will be forwarded to Scio authorities at once if new funds are allotted.

A largely-attended chamber of commerce meeting Friday voted to petition the school board of district 95 to apply for funds for the new building. All school board members were present and signified their approval of the proposal. PWA funds, if acquired, would supply 45 per cent of the money for the building, the remainder to be borrowed by the school district.

Water Funds Available
W. P. A. funds are available for improvement of Scio's city water system, according to H. F. Merrill, WPA district administrator at Corvallis. Materials for the project must be furnished by the city, Merrill states. The WPA will furnish all labor for unearthing the water pipes, repairing them, and recovering them.

The project, as outlined by Scio business men, includes the digging up of all city pipe lines to ascertain where repairs are needed, and replacement of all faulty pipes and couplings. An estimate of the cost of such materials has not been made. The present wooden water mains were laid about 1908.

Under terms of the proposal, the city must hire a surveyor to determine the extent of the pipe lines, and cost of removing the earth before an application for WPA funds can be made. A sum of \$469.41 was reported in the fire, light and water fund at the January meeting. However, bills are outstanding for a new motor and repair work.

Compensation for relief work under WPA is \$43 monthly for skilled labor, \$50 for intermediate, and \$44 for common labor.
