She was for many years secretary of Salem grange and at time of her illness served as master. Her mother before her had served Salem grange as secretary for 25 years. Miss Fletcher was a member of the Rebekah lodge and the Unitarian church.

She was educated in the Salem schools and Willamette university and taught in Salem and at Lebanon.

Surviving are a nephew, Norman Fletcher of Salem; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Kate Fletcher Vent of Salem; and cousins, the E. B. Fletcher family and the Scott Hobart family of Silverton.

Influencing Liquor Ad Placement by Employe Of Commission Banned

Formal notice to all employees of the state liquor commission that they should desist from any attempt to influence the placing of any advertising matter affecting liquors sold by the state, was being sent out yesterday by the commission. Officers, agents and employees of the commission were warned that summary discharge would follow information being received by the commission that its workers were trying to direct the flow of advertising. The notice was sent to all newspapers in the state, to salesmen and distributors for liquor as well as to the agencies where liquor is sold.

At its last meeting the commission was advised that attempts were being made to win advertising from certain distributors of liquor products in return for help with the state commission in getting liquors sold in the state system.

Data on Hospital Is Offered Board

The state board of control yesterday took under advisement a request by Mildred Davis of Hillsboro that she be granted a hearing for several Washington county persons who desired to present data concerning the administration of the state tuberculosis hospital to the board. Governor Martin said he would want to know more concerning the data to be submitted before granting the hearing.

The board last week sustained Dr. Grover C. Beilinger in accepting the resignation of Dr. Phillip Newmyer as principal physician at the hospital. Newmyer was said to have been "disloyal" to the administration.

Credit Group to Meet Here Today

Reports Scheduled Along With Election of Two Members of Board

Complete reports of operations of the Willamette Production Credit association will be made in the annual stockholders meeting to be held this morning at 10 o'clock in the chamber of commerce rooms here. George H. Fullenwider, president of the association, will preside. John M. Throne, secretary-treasurer of the group, will make the reports.

Fullenwider said yesterday the public was invited to attend the meeting, although voting will be limited to stockholders.

J. W. Bradley, treasurer of the Production Credit corporation of Spokane, which is an investor in the non-voting stock of the local association, will attend the meeting and will discuss "Production Credit."

Name Two Directors
Two of the five directors of the credit association will be elected today, with three directors holding over until next year. Authorized capital of the credit association is \$500,000. Borrowers must own \$5 in stock for each \$100 of credit extended to them. The association rediscunts borrowers' paper with the Spokane Production bank and upon the spread of three per cent between the interest paid by the borrower and paid to the discounting bank, the local association operates.

19 Engaged Here In Adult Courses

Variety of Subjects Gets Attention; Chance for Knowledge Stressed

Nineteen teachers are now busy in Marion county on adult education projects sponsored by the WPA through the state department of education. C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, announced yesterday. Mr. Howard said that 300 teachers had found employment in the state as a whole with 500 classes being offered adults and with 19 nursery schools being conducted for children from two to five years of age.

A variety of adult classes are being taught this year including Americanization classes for the foreign-born, public speaking, economics, first aid, crafts, parent education, commercial law, English, hobbies, sewing, cooking, recreation, literature, social problems, radio, aviation courses and similar classes.

Mr. Howard has general charge of the WPA adult education program. State director is E. J. Maske and he is assisted by Mrs. Sarah V. Case, state supervisor of nursery schools, and by Kenneth Beach, state supervisor of adult education. In this county George Birrell has been appointed county supervisor of adult education and Mrs. Annette Lang is nursery school training supervisor.
