Veterans Pleased At Bonus Passage

Salem members of the American Legion were generally highly pleased with the national senate's action yesterday in voting to pay them their war bonus in baby bonds. It was evident at last night's meeting of Capital Post No. 9, Adjutant William Bliven declared, at least 95 per cent of them will "put the money to good use."

A recent nationwide survey by the Legion, Bliven said, showed that fully 25 per cent of the veterans eligible for bonus payments would use this money "to pay bills." He looked for a sharp increase in receipts by the veterans state aid commission after the bonus paying bonds have been issued as ex-soldiers began paying off loans made by the commission.

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Expect \$4000 Federal Fund

Bank Elects Officers and Directors; Wienert Asks Release

MONMOUTH, Jan. 21.—Mayor Bowersox has appointed Mrs. V. V. Caldwell, director of the WPA sewing project for Monmouth. Mrs. Caldwell reports that while the project has been approved in part, it still has not been done to start work until official approval arrives from Washington, D. C. headquarters. Mrs. Caldwell is president of the women's auxiliary of the American Legion.

It is believed the project will supply work for about 15 women making garments and doing other sewing for those eligible for such relief. It is proposed to furnish work at 30 cents per hour per individual, 30 hours each week, and 120 hours per month. The project supplies most of the material through WPA aid amounting to approximately \$4000 for materials and labor, if local contributions are made to purchase incidental materials. The Monmouth Luncheon club voted \$10 toward the contributory fund.

Directors and officers of the Monmouth bank were elected at the annual meeting this week, as follows: I. C. Powell, J. F. Wienert, Edward Riddell, James Riddell, W. R. Graham, Jack Stum, and F. H.
