

Land For Park Left to Town

Maude Henderson Leaves Church Institutions Monies Also

ALBANY, Jan. 22.—The city of Albany has received three tracts of land for park purposes through the will of the Maude E. Henderson estate. It was learned today when the will was admitted to probate by Judge Barrett.

One tract consists of the residence property of Miss Henderson at Eighth and Calapooia grounds and the other is part of a five-acre tract a short distance from the campus of Albany college and is on the Albany-Corvallis east-side highway near the Calapooia river. The only condition specified in regard to these two gifts is that they will be maintained for public use.

Estate Worth \$26,000
The estate estimated at \$26,000, includes \$12,000 in real property and \$14,000 in personal. Of this \$13,500 is bequeathed to elementary and church institutions and to relatives and friends. The remainder of the estate goes to Guy S. Henderson of Portland, a half brother of the deceased.

Bequests include \$500 to Riverside cemetery association of Albany; \$250 to the Florence Crittendon home in Portland; \$250 to the Boys' and Girls' Aid society of Portland; \$500 to the Christian Missionary convention which convenes annually at Turner, and \$2,500 to the United Christian Missionary society, Indianapolis, Ind.

Miss Henderson, who has been a resident of Albany for many years, died at the Albany General hospital December 31, 1935.

MONMOUTH, Jan. 22.—Miss Alice M. McIntosh, formerly principal of the teacher training department of Oregon Normal school, died at her home here Tuesday. She was born in Montreal and made her home for many years at Oconomowoc, Wis.

After being graduated from Whitewater Normal school in that state, she became a member of its teaching staff. In 1911 she came to Monmouth as a member of the Oregon Normal school faculty and taught continuously until 1929. Retiring from teaching at that time she has made her home in Monmouth since.

Miss McIntosh maintained a voluminous correspondence with many former students, now teaching in the northwest, who continued to consult her about teaching problems. Although living a retired life, she was constantly in touch with her professional contemporaries, and a never-failing source of inspiration and help to others.

Surviving are one sister, Mrs. Arthur Hathaway and a nephew, both of Oconomowoc, Wis. Funeral services will be held at her home Saturday at 2 p. m. in the Knights of Pythias cemetery at Monmouth, where her mother was buried in 1920.
